BACKGROUND: This ordinance authorizes the appropriation and expenditure of up to \$75,000.00 of the 2020 HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) entitlement grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and to enter into a commitment letter, loan agreement, promissory note, and mortgage with Habitat for Humanity MidOhio for the construction of a single family home.

Habitat for Humanity MidOhio (HFHMO) proposes to build one new single-family home in the City of Columbus at 1344 E 15th Avenue. The home will be built to AWARE standards and is designed to blend in with the surrounding neighborhood. It will be a single story home with a front porch and no garage and built on vacant property purchased from COCIC.

The first-time homebuyer identified for this home is a single mother with two children. She earns below 80% of the Area Median Income.

HFHMO has a 34 year history of creating safe, decent, affordable homeownership opportunities for low-and very-low-income families. An affiliate of Habitat for Humanity International, HFHMO has built, repaired, or rehabilitated more than 600 homes throughout their service area of Franklin, Madison, and Licking Counties. Their homes are typically sold to first-time homebuyers earning 30%-60% of the Area Median Income who are willing to partner with them by completing a homeownership education course and up to 200 hours of sweat equity work on their own home, as well as other Habitat homes.

A unique aspect of the Habitat model is that they offer no-interest, no-profit mortgages to their buyers, making

the homes affordable to families who would not qualify for traditional mortgages.

BACKGROUND: Columbus City Council (COUNCIL), by Ordinance No. 2252-2017, passed September 18, the City of Columbus (CITY) to enter into an Enterprise Zone Agreement (the authorized AGREEMENT) with 93 OHRPT, LLC; Ronald Benderson 1995 Trust & Benderson 85-1 Trust dba Benderson Development Company (ENTERPRISE) for a tax abatement of seventy-five percent (75%) for a period of ten (10) years in consideration of an \$8.032 million investment in real property improvements and the creation of twenty (20) new full-time permanent positions with an annual payroll of approximately \$700,000 related to the construction of two separate speculative Class A light industrial/flex facilities totaling approximately 267,750 square feet at 6380-6492 and 6530 Tussing Road on parcel numbers 010-200001, 010-007362 and 010-238624 (the PROJECT SITE), in Columbus Ohio, within the Columbus City School District and within the Columbus Southeast Enterprise Zone. The AGREEMENT was made and entered into effective December 11, 2017 The AGREEMENT stated that construction on the improvements (the PROJECT) was (EZA #392-17-01). expected to begin Spring 2018 with all real property improvements expected to be completed by Summer 2019, and that no real property exemption was to commence after 2020 nor extend beyond 2029.

Type:

Due to delays in PROJECT commencement and based on the recommendations of the 2019 Columbus Tax Incentive Review Council ("TIRC"), the AGREEMENT was subsequently amended to state that the PROJECT was expected to begin March 2020, that all improvements were expected to be completed by December 31, 2020, that no real property exemption would commence after 2021 nor extend beyond 2030, and that the job creation timeline was adjusted accordingly.

The CITY reported the status of the PROJECT to the 2021 TIRC on August 20, 2021, in that per ENTERPRISE, the PROJECT had yet to begin per the amended timeframe and that ENTERPRISE had again requested that the AGREEMENT be amended to again revise the construction and abatement windows. The CITY advised the TIRC that it was not amenable to amending the AGREEMENT, with the TIRC then recommending that the AGREEMENT be dissolved and that ENTERPRISE should come back to the CITY when they are ready to undertake the project.

COUNCIL, by Resolution 0145X-2021, passed September 20, 2021, accepted the written recommendations presented by the 2021 TIRC.

This legislation is presented as an emergency measure in order for this dissolution to be legislated in the most expedient manner as possible so that this dissolution of the AGREEMENT can be reported to the necessary local and state agencies prior to the end of calendar year 2021.

FISCAL IMPACT: No funding is required for this legislation.

To dissolve the Enterprise Zone Agreement with 93 OHRPT, LLC; Ronald Benderson 1995 Trust & Benderson 85-1 Trust dba Benderson Development Company (ENTERPRISE), and to direct the Director of

the Department of Development to notify as necessary the local and state tax authorities, and to declare an emergency.

WHEREAS, the City of Columbus (CITY) entered into an Enterprise Zone Agreement (the "AGREEMENT") with 93 OHRPT, LLC; Ronald Benderson 1995 Trust & Benderson 85-1 Trust dba Benderson Development Company (ENTERPRISE), approved by Columbus City Council (COUNCIL) on September 18, 2017 by Ordinance No. 2252-2017 with this AGREEMENT made and entered into effective December 11, 2017; and

WHEREAS, the AGREEMENT granted a 75%/10-Year abatement on real property improvements; and

WHEREAS, the incentive was granted in consideration of an \$8.032 million investment in real property improvements, and the creation of twenty (20) new full-time permanent positions with an annual payroll of approximately \$700,000 related to the construction of two separate speculative Class A light industrial/flex facilities totaling approximately 267,750 square feet at 6380-6492 and 6530 Tussing Road on parcel numbers 010 -200001, 010-007362 and 010-238624 (the PROJECT SITE), in Columbus Ohio, within the Columbus City School District and within the Columbus Southeast Enterprise Zone; and

WHEREAS, the AGREEMENT stated that construction on the improvements (the PROJECT) was expected to begin Spring 2018 with all real property improvements expected to be completed by Summer 2019, and that no real property exemption was to commence after 2020 nor extend beyond 2029; and

The proposed rate configuration for 2022 recognizes that water and sewer charges disproportionately affect lower income groups. The Department of Public Utilities will continue the Low Income Discount Program that discounts participant's sewer commodity portion of their quarterly bill by 20%.

Requested adjustments in rates result in a typical inside city residential water rate increase of 4%. When a sewer increase of 5% and a 3% increase in stormwater rates are considered, the overall impact on a typical residential customer's bill in the City of Columbus is 4.49%, and for a typical outside city residential customer, the overall bill impact is 4.52%. Low Income Discount participant's overall bill impact is 4.48%. Outside city customers are not charged stormwater fees. Considering the 2022 rates increases for water, sewer, and storm combined -- based on average household water use of 30 ccf's per quarter, City of Columbus residents are estimated to see their total bill increase \$13.60 per quarter, or \$54.40 per year.

The Sewer and Water Advisory Board (SWAB) met on October 6, 2021, and after reviewing the Department of Public Utilities' projected expenditures for Fiscal Year 2022, recommends to City Council a 4% increase in water rates and no increase to the water capacity charges.

FISCAL IMPACT: These rate increases will generate approximately \$6.5 million in additional revenue in Fiscal Year 2022. Combined with rate increases for Sewer and Stormwater, the overall impact to a City of Columbus' residents bill will be 4.49%.

To amend various sections of Chapter 1105 of the Columbus City Codes, and to enact new water rates for the year beginning January 1, 2022, and to repeal the existing sections being amended.

WHEREAS, it is necessary to establish new water services rates, effective January 1, 2022, for water service provided by the City of Columbus in order to recover the cost of rendering said water services; and

WHEREAS, the City of Columbus, Department of Public Utilities Division of Water requests that a 4% rate increase be applied to water rates for 2022; and

WHEREAS, the City of Columbus, Department of Public Utilities requests that water capacity fees not be increased in fiscal year 2022, and

WHEREAS, City Council recognizes that increased water rates disproportionately impact low income residents. Low income residents already pay a higher percentage of their household income in utility bills, and this percentage would increase with higher rates; and

WHEREAS, City Council further recognizes that past rate increases in the City have demonstrated that increasing rates leads to increased delinquencies among the City's customers; delinquency rates are higher among low income residents. It is well recognized that increased delinquencies are expensive for the City and its customers; and

The proposed rate configuration for 2022 recognizes that water and sewer charges disproportionately affect lower income groups. The Department of Public Utilities will continue the Low Income Discount Program that discounts participant's sewer commodity portion of their sewer bill by 20%.

Requested adjustments in rates result in a typical inside city residential sewer rate increase of 5%. When a water increase of 4% and a 3% increase in stormwater rates are considered, the overall impact on a typical residential customer's bill in the City of Columbus is 4.49%, and for a typical outside city residential customer, the overall bill impact is 4.52%. Low Income Discount participant's overall bill impact is 4.48%. Outside city customers are not charged stormwater fees. Considering the 2022 rates increases for water, sewer, and storm combined -- based on average household water use of 30 ccf's per quarter, City of Columbus residents are estimated to see their total bill increase \$13.60 per quarter, or \$54.40 per year.

In 2005, in accordance with Ordinance No.1904-2005, passed November 28, 2005, Council created a Clean River Fee to recover costs of construction of projects necessary to meet the requirements of the two consent orders that mandate elimination of wet weather flow from Combined Sewer Overflows and Sanitary Sewer Overflows. This charge was assessed based on each property's measured impervious surface area. Since 2005, Council has approved across-the-board rate increases, including the Clean River Fee. The Department of Public Utilities, with approval of the Sewer and Water Advisory Board (SWAB), recommends that the Clean River Fee again be increased with an across-the-board rate increase of 5% to continue to allow wet weather construction projects to be paid for by a blend of the Clean River Fee and Commodity Charges.

The proposed rate structure is necessary to continue to address projects related to the two (2) consent orders entered into in 2002 and 2004 mandating the City of Columbus to mitigate wet weather flow from Combined Sewer Overflows (CSO) and Sanitary Sewer Overflows (SSO) and other operating costs and infrastructure

improvements.

The Division of Sewerage and Drainage charges some industrial customers an extra strength charge. Extra strength charges are for the treatment of high strength wastewater generated by various industries that require additional treatment processes within the wastewater treatment plants. To stay economically competitive, the Department of Public Utilities is recommending no rate adjustment for Total Kjeldhal Nitrogen (TKN), Suspended Solids (SS), and Biological Oxygen Demand (BOD).

The Sewer and Water Advisory Board (SWAB) met on October 6, 2021, and after reviewing the Department of Public Utilities' projected expenditures for Fiscal Year 2022, recommends to City Council a 5% increase in sewer rates and no increase to the sewer capacity charges.

FISCAL IMPACT: These rate increases will generate approximately \$10.9 million in additional revenue in the Sewer Operating Fund in Fiscal Year 2022.

To amend Section 1147.11 of the Columbus City Codes to enact new sanitary sewer service rates for the year beginning January 1, 2022; and to repeal the existing section being amended.

WHEREAS, it is necessary to establish new sewer sanitary services rates, effective January 1, 2022, for sewerage services to properties discharging into the sanitary sewerage system of the City of Columbus in order to recover the cost of rendering said sewerage services for the calendar year; and

WHEREAS, the City of Columbus, Department of Public Utilities, Division of Sewerage and Drainage requests a 5% increase in sewer rates for 2022 to pay for necessary ongoing operations and needed improvements; and

WHEREAS, the City of Columbus, Department of Public Utilities, Division of Sewerage and Drainage recommends no rate adjustments for industry Extra Strength rates for TKN, SS and BOD.

WHEREAS, the City of Columbus, Department of Public Utilities requests that sewer capacity fees not be increased in fiscal year 2022, and

WHEREAS, in addition to the commodity rates, City Council finds it necessary to continue a Clean River Fee to fund the wet weather capital improvement projects required by the Consent Orders with the State of Ohio; and

WHEREAS, City Council finds that the most appropriate way to assess the Clean River surcharge is by correlating the surcharge to the amount of impervious surface, as the factor most closely associated with increased inflow and infiltration is impervious cover from urban development; and

WHEREAS, City Council recognizes that increased sewer rates disproportionately impact low income residents. Low income residents already pay a higher percentage of their household income in utility bills, and this percentage would increase with higher rates; and

WHEREAS, City Council further recognizes that past rate increases in the City have demonstrated that increasing rates leads to increased delinquencies among the City's customers; delinquency rates are higher among low income residents. It is well recognized that increased delinquencies are expensive for the City and its customers; and

WHEREAS, City Council finds that continuing the discount rate for low income users at 20% is appropriate to assist those least able to manage the impacts of increased sewer and water rates; and

The stormwater charges per Equivalent Residential Unit (ERU) will increase from \$4.91 to \$5.06 per month for a typical Inside City residential customer.

Requested adjustments in rates result in a typical inside city residential storm water rate increase of 3%. When a sewer increase of 5% and a 4% increase in water rates are considered, the overall impact on a typical residential customer's bill in the City of Columbus is 4.49%, and for a typical outside city residential customer, the overall bill impact is 4.52%. Low Income Discount participant's overall bill impact is 4.48%. Outside city customers are not charged stormwater fees. Considering the 2022 rates increases for water, sewer, and storm combined -- based on average household water use of 30 ccf's per quarter, City of Columbus residents are estimated to see their total bill increase \$13.60 per quarter, or \$54.40 per year.

The stormwater ERU charge is assessed based on each property's measured impervious surface area. Each Equivalent Residential Unit (ERU) is based on 2000 sq ft of impervious surface area. Residents are charged at one (1) ERU per residence. All other customers are charged based on measured impervious area divided by 2000 sq ft to determine an ERU equivalent.

The Sewer and Water Advisory Board (SWAB) met on October 6, 2021, and after reviewing the Department of Public Utilities' projected expenditures for Fiscal Year 2022, recommends to City Council a 3% increase in storm rates.

FISCAL IMPACT: These rate increases will generate approximately \$1,100,000 in additional revenue in Fiscal Year 2022.

To amend Section 1149.08 of the Columbus City Codes, to enact new Stormwater fees for the year beginning

January 1, 2022, and to repeal the existing Section being amended.

WHEREAS, the Sewer and Water Advisory Board met on October 6, 2021, and after reviewing the Department of Public Utilities projected expenditures for 2022, recommends to City Council an increase of 3% in stormwater rates, and

WHEREAS, stormwater fees are not charged to those customers outside of the City of Columbus, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to increase the monthly Stormwater charges from \$4.91 per Equivalent Residential Unit (ERU) to \$5.06 per ERU to accurately match needed revenue to estimated program expenses; now, therefore.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

SECTION 1. That effective January 1, 2022, Section 1149.08 of the Columbus City Codes be, and is hereby, amended to read as follows:

1149.08 Rate Structure

Charges within corporate limits. For the purpose stated in Sections 1149.03 and 1149.10 there is hereby charged to each user situated within the corporate limits of the City of Columbus, that is tributary directly or indirectly to the stormwater system of the city, stormwater charges as hereinbefore provided, and in the amount determinable as follows:

For any such property, lot, parcel of land, building or premises that is tributary directly or indirectly to the stormwater system of the city, such charge shall be based upon the quantity of impervious area situated thereon.

(a)

All properties having impervious area within the city will be assigned an equivalent residential unit (ERU), or a multiple thereof, with all properties having impervious area receiving at least one (1) ERU.

(1)

Residential properties. All residential properties will be assigned one (1) ERU. A flat rate will apply to all residential properties.

(2)

Non-residential properties. Non-residential properties will be assigned an ERU multiple based upon the properties' individually measured impervious area (in square feet) divided by two thousand (2,000) square feet (one (1) ERU). This division will be calculated to the first decimal place and rounded according to mathematical convention.

(b) The charge as prescribed in the rate schedule is as follows:

SECTION 2. That stormwater rates herein established shall be applicable for all stormwater charges on or after January 1, 2022.

SECTION 4. That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

The purpose of this legislation is to authorize the Director of Public Utilities to pay the State of Ohio, Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (OEPA) Annual Discharge Fees for the Jackson Pike and Southerly Wastewater Treatment Plants, and the Storm Water MS4 Annual Discharge Fee for fiscal year 2021.

House Bill 152 became law in July 1993. This law created a series of fees to provide financial support for the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency. Included in these fees are an annual Wastewater Treatment Plant Discharge Fee, and an annual Municipal Storm Water Discharge Fee, assessed to public dischargers and required to be paid by holders of National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits.

The Division of Sewerage and Drainage holds two such Wastewater Treatment Plant Discharge permits: Jackson Pike Permit Number 4PF00001. The Jackson Pike Wastewater Treatment Plant and the Southerly Wastewater Treatment Plant each have discharge fees totaling \$41,400.00, and payment is due on January 30, 2022. A ten percent (10%) penalty is assessed if payment is not received on or before January 30, 2022, by the Ohio EPA.

The fees for calendar year 2021 are based upon the average volume of wastewater discharged by each facility during the previous year (2020) between May 1 and October 31. During this period, the Jackson Pike Wastewater Treatment Plant averaged 69.831 million gallons per day (MGD) and the Southerly Wastewater Treatment Plant averaged 96.2099 MGD.

The Division of Sewerage and Drainage, Stormwater Section holds one such permit: Municipal Storm Water Discharge Permit Number 4PI00000*CD. The Stormwater section has discharge fees totaling \$10,000.00, and payment is due on January 30, 2022. A ten percent (10%) penalty is assessed if payment is not received on or before January 30, 2022 by the Ohio EPA.

The Municipal Storm Water Discharge fees for calendar year 2021 are based upon the Area Permitted (square miles) of 225.79 x \$100 (not to exceed \$10,000) for the previous year (2020).

To authorize the Director of Public Utilities to pay the annual Discharge Fees for Fiscal Year 2021 to the Treasurer of State of Ohio, Ohio Environmental Protection Agency for the Division of Sewerage and Drainage; and to authorize the expenditure of \$82,800.00 from the Sewer Operating Sanitary Fund and \$10,000.00 from the Storm Sewer Operating Fund. (\$92,800.00)

WHEREAS, House Bill 152 became law in July 1993 and created a series of fees which provide financial support for the State of Ohio, Ohio Environmental Protection Agency; and

WHEREAS, included in these fees are an annual Wastewater Treatment Plant Discharge Fee and an annual Municipal Storm Water Discharge Fee, assessed to public dischargers and to be paid by holders of NPDES permits; and

WHEREAS, the Division of Sewerage and Drainage holds such permits for the Jackson Pike and Southerly Wastewater Treatment Plants, and the Stormwater Section; and

WHEREAS, the fees for calendar year 2021 are based upon the average volume of wastewater discharged by each facility during the previous year (2020), between May 1 and October 31. During this period, the Jackson Pike Wastewater Treatment Plant averaged 69.831 MGD and the Southerly Wastewater Treatment Plant averaged 96.2099 MGD; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Storm Water Discharge fee for calendar year 2021 is based upon the Area Permitted (square miles) of 225.79 x \$100 (not to exceed \$10,000) for the previous year (2020), and

WHEREAS, the Wastewater Treatment Plant fees were first paid in January 1994, and the Municipal Storm Water Discharge fees and annual Public Discharger fees were first paid in January 2004. With the exception of the annual Public Discharger fee which is no longer charged, all fees have been paid each year thereafter, and have been budgeted for the 2021 payments; and

WHEREAS, payment is due on or before January 30, 2022 to prevent a ten percent (10%) penalty; and

WHEREAS, it has become necessary in the usual daily operation of the Department of Public Utilities, Division of Sewerage and Drainage, to authorize the Director of Public Utilities to pay for the annual Discharge Fees for 2021 with the State of Ohio, Ohio Environmental Protection Agency; now, therefore

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

SECTION 1. That the Director of Public Utilities be and is hereby authorized to pay the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency, through the Treasurer, State of Ohio, Ohio EPA, P. O. Box 77005, Cleveland, OH 44194-7005 for annual Discharge Fees for 2021 upon receipt of proper invoices.

SECTION 2. That the expenditure of \$92,800.00, or so much thereof as may be needed, is hereby authorized, in Fund 6100 Sewer Operating Sanitary Fund in object class 03 Services in the amount of \$82,800.00, and in Fund 6200 Storm Sewer Operating Fund in object class 03 Services in the amount of \$10,000.00, per the

accounting codes in the attachment to this ordinance.

SECTION 3. That the funds necessary to carry out the purpose of this ordinance are hereby deemed appropriated, and the City Auditor shall establish such accounting codes as necessary.

SECTION 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

The Director of Public Utilities entered into a contract with Righter Company, Inc. to provide Specialty Maintenance Crafts Services for various Divisions of the Department of Public Utilities, FEM Project No. 0101.6. This modification No. 1 is to add additional funding for repairs and replacements at various locations of the Division of Sewerage and Drainage.

The Department of Public Utilities advertised and solicited competitive bids in accordance with the relevant provisions of Columbus City Code Chapter 329 (RFQ013910). Two Hundred and Ninety-Five (295) vendors were solicited and one (1) bid from Righter Company, Inc., was received and opened on November 6, 2019. The bid from Righter Company, Inc. was awarded as the lowest, responsive, responsible and best bid received. The original contract was for a period of one year with three (3) one year renewal options on a year to year basis upon mutual agreement, availability of funding and Columbus City Council approval. If unforeseen issues or difficulties are encountered that would require additional funding, a modification will be requested. This is the 3rd year of a four (4) year contract. This contract was previously renewed for year 3 and extended through January 21, 2023. The purpose of this modification #1 is to add funding for needed repairs without extending the term of the contract.

The contract modification will continue to provide Specialty Maintenance Crafts Services for the Department of Public Utilities facilities. Anticipated DOSD work for this modification includes items such as paving at various pump stations for the Jackson Pike WWTP, and door improvements, including the repair of a speed door, replacement of wash bay doors, an exterior door and an overhead door, and the sealing and striping of parking lots, all at the Fairwood Facility.

SUPPLIER: Righter Company, Inc. (31-0889208), DAX #004433, Expires December 17, 2021 Righter Company, Inc. does not hold MBE/FBE status.

The company is not debarred according to the Excluded Party Listing System of the Federal Government or prohibited from being awarded a contract according to the Auditor of State Unresolved Findings for Recovery Certified Search.

- 1. <u>Amount of additional funds</u>: Total amount of additional funds needed for this contract modification No. 1 is \$165,000.00 for the Division of Sewerage and Drainage. Total contract amount including this modification is \$2,862,439.00.
- 2. Reason additional funds were not foreseen: The need for additional funding was known at the time of the original contract. The original legislation, under Ordinance No. 3014-2019, anticipated the contract would be funded incrementally with renewals on an approximate annual basis. It was also anticipated that if unforeseen issues or difficulties were encountered that would require additional funding, a modification would be requested. This legislation is to encumber the funds budgeted for fiscal year 2021 that are necessary to complete work for the Department of Public Utilities at various facilities of the Division of Sewerage and Drainage.
- 3. Reason other procurement processes not used: Work under this modification is a continuation of services included in the scope of the original bid contract. No lower pricing/more attractive terms and conditions are anticipated at this time.
- 4. <u>How was cost determined:</u> The cost, terms and conditions to provide Specialty Maintenance Crafts Services for DPU facility equipment and components are in accordance with the original contract.

FISCAL IMPACT: \$165,000.00 was budgeted and is needed from within the Sewer Operating Sanitary Fund for these expenditures. The contract amount will be utilized to provide services under this contract for the various DOSD facilities.

BACKGROUND AND FISCAL IMPACT:

As part of the 2021 third quarter financial review, the Department of Finance and Management identified surpluses and deficits in various object classes in several divisions. In order to properly align appropriations with projected expenditures and allow divisions to operate without interruption through the end of 2021, it is necessary to transfer \$19,038,000.00 among divisions within the general fund, to transfer \$771,000 in cash from the general fund to the property management fund, and to authorize a supplemental appropriation in the property management fund.

Object class surpluses and deficits were projected as part of the third quarter financial review. This ordinance makes transfers to reflect these projections. The amounts may not mirror the third quarter review exactly due to transfers that have occurred in the interim as well as adjustments made in projections since the completion of the review.

This ordinance also authorizes appropriation transfers and additional appropriations for certain non-general fund departments and divisions in order to provide appropriations in the necessary object classes for the remainder of the fiscal year.

Lastly, additional appropriation is necessary from the collection of all fines, fees, and from other sources of revenue in the recreation and parks operating fund and the development services fund, to properly align appropriations with projected expenditures.

EMERGENCY DESIGNATION

This ordinance is submitted as an emergency so as to allow these financial transactions to be posted in the city's accounting system as soon as possible. Up to date financial posting promotes accurate accounting and financial management.

To authorize and direct the City Auditor to provide for the transfer of \$19,038,000.00 within the general fund; to authorize the transfer of cash in the amount of \$771,000.00 from the general fund to the property management fund; to transfer appropriations between objects in certain non-general fund departments and divisions; to authorize and direct the City Auditor to appropriate additional funds in the recreation and parks operating fund, the development services fund, and the property management fund; and to declare an emergency (\$19,038,000.00).

1.2. Reasons additional goods/services could not be foreseen:

This is a three-year agreement for fiscal years 2020 - 2022 and modifications were anticipated and explained in the original legislation under Ordinance No. 0130-2020.

1.3. Reason other procurement processes are not used:

This is a multi-year contract that will be modified as required to provide construction administration/inspection services for construction projects that bid during the three year (2020-2022) time frame.

1.4. How cost of modification was determined:

The cost of Modification No. 9 was determined by negotiations between Stantec Consulting Services Inc. and the Division of Sewerage and Drainage.

2.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT/ADVANTAGES; COMMUNITY OUTREACH; PROJECT DEVELOPMENT; ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS/ADVANTAGES OF PROJECT: The use of more sustainable, and environmentally friendly systems, commonly referred to as "green" infrastructure, has been recognized and implemented in many communities as a potential solution to many of the elements associated with EPA consent order requirements. Green infrastructure also provides additional stormwater treatment benefits, as well as potentially mitigating street flooding and impacts to receiving streams.

The construction of green infrastructure will have an impact on the local economy by creating the need for personnel to construct and maintain the proposed facilities, as well as obtaining project related materials from local suppliers and vendors.

An additional benefit of these projects is the possible re-purposing of Columbus Land Redevelopment Office (Land Bank), abandoned, and vacant parcels for the implementation of Green Infrastructure (GI). The City wishes to explore viable GI and low-impact development (LID) technologies which could be constructed on

these vacant or abandoned parcels/lots within the project area to achieve a stormwater benefit.

The majority of the projects will reduce inflow and infiltration to the City's sanitary sewer system thus mitigating sanitary sewer overflows to basements and waterways. Other projects provide improvement to existing storm infrastructure to mitigate drainage/flooding issues.

3.0 FUTURE MODIFICATION(S): The Department anticipates requesting additional future modifications to this contract as new construction projects begin during 2021 and 2022.

On December 4, 2015, the Department of Public Utilities received one (1) proposal in response to an RFP for backflow prevention management software services. Tokay Software, Inc. was selected to provide this service. For each year of the ten-year contract, funds for the services shall be reviewed, and expenditures shall be approved by ordinance of City Council, and appropriation and certification of funds by the City Auditor. The first year of the agreement (2016), the contract was funded in the amount of \$43,262.50. The second through sixth years of the agreement (2017-2021), the contract was funded in the amount of \$45,200.00 per year. The maximum obligation of the City for services described in this agreement for the seventh year of the contract (2022) is \$45,200.00. If additional funding is needed, a modification will be processed based upon mutual agreement of the parties, approval by City Council, and certification of the funds by the City Auditor.

Tokay Software, Inc. publishes and supports cross-connection control program management software for use in managing backflow prevention within a water distribution system. This software is necessary to allow for management of the office database, management of the office workflow, and online submittal of up to 42,000 annual backflow prevention assembly test reports processed by the Backflow Compliance Office as part of their regulatory compliance program. The ongoing software support allows DPU's users of the software to continue to search customer records, create notification letters for the regulatory enforcement duties of the office, and to monitor customer compliance with the protection, testing, and survey requirements of City Code, DPU Rules and Regulations, and the Ohio Administrative Code.

The existing HVAC control system at the Division of Fleet is beyond its useful life and as such, the control infrastructure has become obsolete and in need of replacement. This system controls the functioning of the HVAC system, such as airflow, cooling and heating at the Division of Fleet.

Emergency action is requested so that a new HVAC control system can be installed as soon as possible, thus ensuring the proper operation of the Division of Fleet's HVAC system.

BACKGROUND: This legislation authorizes the Public Safety Director to modify the current contract with ShotSpotter, Inc. to continue a gunfire detection, alert, and analysis program for a year. The department has deployed technology commonly known as ShotSpotter, a subscription based service that involves the installation of a gunfire sensor network in areas identified by the City. These sensors connect to a cloud-based data center infrastructure, providing a 24/7/365 gunfire monitoring service within a nine (9) square-mile radius of the installed sensor infrastructure.

In addition to gunfire detection, the ShotSpotter service will notify law enforcement agencies of gunfire incidents and direct them to the precise location of illegal gunfire. The service also offers the capability to instantly notify officers of shootings in progress with real-time data delivered to dispatch officers, patrol cars, and smart phones. The alerts are intended to improve police response to incidents of gunfire, enhance officer safety, speed aid to victims, assist in investigations and the collection of evidence, and ultimately, the apprehension of dangerous offenders.

The data collected from this gunfire detection service can also be used to help prevent future crimes by informing law enforcement of prospective locations where gun related crimes are likely to occur. Agencies that have adopted ShotSpotter Technology as part of a comprehensive crime-reduction strategy have reported reductions in urban gunfire by up to 80 percent and related violent crime by as much as 40 percent. The gunfire detection system can also be integrated with existing City technology infrastructure to capture, layer, and share data across platforms.

This is a planned modification that is a continuation of existing services. The original contract for services dated October 4, 2018 was established by ordinance 2151-2018 for \$685,000. Modification No 1 authorized via Ordinance 1218-2020 was for only 6 months for existing locations because of ongoing discussions for expansion that had not yet concluded. Modification, number two, was to extend the existing contract for eighteen months for \$922,215.00 and to increase the coverage area for one year for \$210,000. Previously established subscription price through negotiations was used for the cost of this modification. This third modification is to renew the services in the 9 mile radius for a year in the amount of \$630,000.00

Because of the established relationship with this contractor and the fact that they have technology in place at the required locations to interface with Columbus police equipment, it is not practical to bid out this service and incur start-up fees and break in coverage.

BACKGROUND: This legislation is needed in order for the City to pay the Ohio Water Development Authority (OWDA) loan fee for a Division of Sewerage and Drainage capital project receiving funding through the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency's Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF) which is administered by OWDA. The loan fee has been invoiced for the following project which was awarded WPCLF loan financing at the October 28, 2021 Ohio Water Development Authority Board meeting:

Second Barrel Interconnector Augmentation Project (CIP# 650860-116300); Loan amount: \$9,408,487.00; Loan Fee: \$32,930.00.

This Sanitary System Engineering Section project (identified in Section 1) has been approved for financing through the Ohio Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF) and authorized via Ordinance 2762-2020 which passed December 14, 2020.

The Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF) loan program is jointly administered by the Ohio EPA Division of Environmental and Financial Assistance and the Ohio Water Development Authority (OWDA). The WPCLF provides below-market interest rate loans for municipal wastewater treatment improvements. The interest rate for this loan is 0.48%.

FISCAL IMPACT: \$32,930.00 is needed for Loan Fee expenditures.

CONTRACT COMPLIANCE: Ohio Water Development Authority (31-6402047-207) is not contract compliant as it is a governmental agency (State of Ohio).

Mayor Ginther's vision for Columbus, America's Opportunity City, is that all children are ready for kindergarten. Addressing early childhood learning means bringing awareness and resources to a critical learning stage in childhood development. Children who come to school ready to learn are more likely to succeed

academically and in life.

Children who participate in high-quality early learning experiences significantly improve their early literacy, language, and math skills. Ample evidence shows that children who enter school unprepared fall farther and

language, and math skills. Ample evidence shows that children who enter school unprepared fall farther and farther behind. Students who get a poor start in their earliest years are likely to struggle in high school and subsequently, fail to graduate.

Child care and early learning programs also fulfill a critical need for our community's workforce. The availability of safe, nurturing environments for children, provides parents, family members, and caregivers the opportunity to attend their jobs or pursue their education.

In Columbus however, many child care teachers and staff have left the industry due to the pandemic. According to data provided by Action For Children, over one-third of child care providers do not have enough teachers to staff their classrooms. Action For Children also projects that Franklin County has a deficit of nearly 1,000 child care teachers and staff. As such, this ordinance requests authority to expend Federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds in support of this contract to address staffing deficiencies impacted by the ongoing pandemic.

In addition, numerous studies have shown that women have left the workforce in great numbers, both nationally and in Ohio - reversing years of progress. The high price of non-subsidized child care tuition for working families is one of the reasons.

Therefore, the Department of Education requests the authority, per City Code Chapter 329 relating to non-profit service contracts, to contract with Action For Children, a Not For Profit organization, to engage in an initiative to recruit child care teachers and staff, to provide one-time signing bonuses to new teachers, and to provide affordability scholarships to working families. The Department of Education does not have the staff capacity to administer either the recruiting or scholarships programs

Fiscal Impact: This ordinance authorizes an expenditure of up to \$3,910,003.00 from funding provided to the City of Columbus from the American Rescue Plan that was passed by Congress on March 10, 2021 and signed into law on March 11, 2021.

Emergency Designation: Emergency designation is requested to ensure that new teachers can be hired, and scholarships are made available to families as soon as possible.

To authorize and direct the Director of the Department of Education to enter into a non-profit service contract with Action For Children for the purpose of engaging in a plan to recruit child care teachers and staff, including providing new teacher signing bonuses and to provide affordability scholarships for working families; to authorize the expenditure of up to \$3,910,003.00 from the Recovery Fund; and to declare an emergency.

WHEREAS, Mayor Ginther's vision for Columbus, America's Opportunity City, is that all children are ready for kindergarten; and

WHEREAS, children who participate in high-quality early learning experiences significantly improve their early literacy, language, and math skills; and

WHEREAS, child care and early learning programs also fulfill a critical need for our community's workforce; and

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in almost 1,000 child care teacher and staff vacancies; and

Background: The City and the Developer previously executed a Tax Increment Financing Agreement dated April 17, 2013 pursuant to authorization by Ordinance 0205-2012 to provide Weinland Park Development, LLC (the "Developer") for reimbursement of costs for eligible public infrastructure improvements benefiting or serving the Weinland Park neighborhood using payments in lieu of taxes generated from the parcels subject to the Weinland Park Incentive District .40(C) TIF established pursuant to authorization by Ordinance 1799-2010 (the "TIF Ordinance"). The Weinland Park Incentive District and surrounding neighborhoods have experienced new growth and development since the passage of the TIF Ordinance, and the area now needs more public parking to allow the public to access the residences, businesses, and public facilities in the area. The Developer is proposing to construct a 311-unit apartment complex and a 557-space structured parking facility with approximately 189 public spaces (the "Project") for a total estimated investment of approximately ninety-eight million dollars (\$98,000,000). The Project will be constructed on approximately ±3.445 acres of real property known as Franklin County Auditor Tax Parcel ID No. 010-024540 owned by an affiliate of the Developer and located to the northeast corner of N. 4th Street and E. 5th Avenue. The Department of Development has submitted Ordinance 2923-2021 to this Council to authorize the Director of Development to enter into a Cooperative Agreement and 1st Amendment to Tax Increment Financing Agreement (the "Cooperative Agreement and 1st Amendment") with the Columbus-Franklin County Finance Authority and the Developer. This ordinance will amend the TIF Ordinance to modify the authorized list of public infrastructure improvements to include parking facilities thereby allowing the City to enter into the Cooperative Agreement and 1st Amendment to finance the public spaces in the Project to address the parking need.

<u>Fiscal Impact</u>: No funding is required for this legislation.

<u>Emergency Justification</u>: Emergency legislation is necessary to allow the Developer to maintain its Project schedule and to allow for the timely sale of bonds to finance the public spaces.

To amend Ordinance 1799-2010 to supplement the authorized list of public infrastructure improvements; and to declare an emergency.

WHEREAS, City Council, by its Ordinance 1799-2010 passed on December 13, 2010 (the "TIF Ordinance"), (i) declared that 100% of the increase in assessed value of the property in the Weinland Park neighborhood of the City to be a public purpose, (ii) exempted such increase in assessed value from real property taxation for a period of thirty (30) years, (iii) required the owners of such property to make service payments to the Franklin County Treasurer, (iv) established a municipal public improvement tax increment equivalent fund for the deposit of those non-school service payments from the Franklin County Treasurer (the "Service Payments"), and (v) designated the public infrastructure improvements to be financed with the Service Payments; and

WHEREAS, the City, as previously authorized pursuant to City Ordinance 0205-2012 passed on February 6, 2012, entered into a Tax Increment Financing Agreement with Weinland Park Development, LLC (the "Developer") dated as of April 17, 2013 (the "Prior TIF Agreement"), under which the City agreed to use the Service Payments to reimburse the Developer for its costs plus additional accrued interest incurred for certain public infrastructure improvements; and

WHEREAS, the Weinland Park Incentive District and the surrounding University District and Short North neighborhoods having experienced new growth and development since the passage of the TIF Ordinance are now in need of more public parking to allow the public to access the residences, businesses, and public facilities in the area; and

WHEREAS, an affiliate of the Developer has acquired certain real property in the City identified as Franklin County Auditor Tax Parcel ID No. 010-024540 (as may be subdivided in the future) which is subject to the TIF Ordinance and on which it plans to develop a 311-unit apartment complex and 557-space parking garage (the "Project") with approximately 189 public spaces (the "Public Spaces"); and

WHEREAS, the Department of Development has submitted Ordinance 2923-2021 to this Council to authorize the Director of Development to enter into a Cooperative Agreement and 1st Amendment (the "Cooperative Agreement and 1st Amendment") with the Columbus-Franklin County Finance Authority (the "CFCFA") and the Developer to finance the Public Spaces; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Cooperative Agreement and 1st Amendment, the parties, among other things, agree the CFCFA will sell bonds to finance the Public Spaces (the "Bonds"), the City will pledge the Service Payments to the debt service of the Bonds, the Developer's right to reimbursement under the Prior TIF Agreement shall be subordinate to the Bonds, and the Developer will indemnify the City for use of the Service Payments; and

WHEREAS, Section 6 of the TIF Ordinance designated the eligible public infrastructure improvements on Exhibit B of the TIF Ordinance as well as authorized any other public infrastructure improvements thereafter designated by ordinance as public infrastructure improvements made, to be made, or once made that benefit or serve parcels subject to the TIF Ordinance; and

Background: City Council passed Ordinance No. 1799-2010 on December 13, 2010 (the "TIF Ordinance") creating the Weinland Park Incentive District .40(C) TIF, requiring the deposit of service payments generated by parcels subject to the TIF Ordinance (the "Service Payments") into a special TIF fund, and designating authorized public improvements to be financed by those Service Payments. Pursuant to Ordinance No. 0205-2012 passed by City Council on February 6, 2012, the City entered into a Tax Increment Financing Agreement with Weinland Park Development, LLC (the "Developer") dated as of April 17, 2013 (the "Prior TIF Agreement") with respect to parcels subject to the TIF Ordinance in order to reimburse the Developer for its costs of certain public improvements benefiting or serving the development of the Weinland Park Incentive District from the Service Payments. The Weinland Park Incentive District and surrounding neighborhoods have experienced new growth and development since the passage of the TIF Ordinance, and the area now needs more public parking to allow the public to access the residences, businesses, and public facilities in the area. The Developer is now proposing to construct a ninety-eight million dollar (\$98,000,000) 311-unit apartment complex and a 557-space structured parking facility (the "Project") with approximately 189 public spaces (the "Public Spaces") on approximately ±3.445 acres of real property known as Franklin County Auditor Tax Parcel ID No. 010-024540 owned by an affiliate of the Developer and located to the northeast corner of N. 4th Street and E. 5th Avenue. The Department of Development has submitted for Council's consideration Ordinance 2918-2021 to amend the TIF Ordinance to add parking facilities to the list of public infrastructure improvements that may be financed with Service Payments. This Ordinance approves and authorizes a new Cooperative Agreement and First Amendment to Tax Increment Financing Agreement by and among the City, the Columbus-Franklin County Finance Authority (the "CFCFA") and the Developer (the "Cooperative Agreement and First Amendment") pursuant to which the CFCFA will issue bonds to finance the Public Spaces; the City will pledge Service Payments to repay those bonds, with such pledge superior in priority to any reimbursement pursuant to the Prior TIF Agreement. This Ordinance will also appropriate and authorize the expenditure of the Service Payments pursuant to the Cooperative Agreement and First Amendment and authorize the Director of Development to execute a Declaration of public parking garage covenants to secure public use of the Public Spaces for 30 years.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance No. 1799-2010 passed December 13, 2010 (as amended by Ordinance 2918-2021 submitted for City Council consideration, collectively the "TIF Ordinance"), this Council created the Weinland Park Incentive District and the Weinland Park .40(C) municipal public improvement tax increment equivalent fund (the "TIF Fund") under Ohio Revised Code Sections 5709.40 to 5709.43 as well as designated certain public improvements (the "Public Improvements") to be financed from service payments generated from the parcels subject to the TIF Ordinance (the "Service Payments") and deposited into the TIF Fund; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance No. 0205-2012 passed by City Council on February 6, 2012, this Council appropriated and authorized the expenditure of the Service Payments in accordance with the Tax Increment Financing Agreement by and among the City and Weinland Park Development, LLC (the "Developer") dated as of April 17, 2013 (the "Prior TIF Agreement") to reimburse the Developer for costs incurred by the Developer for Public Improvements that benefit or serve the development of the Weinland Park Incentive District; and

WHEREAS, an affiliate of the Developer has acquired certain real property identified as Franklin County Auditor Tax Parcel ID No. 010-024540 that is subject to the TIF Ordinance on which it plans to develop a 311-unit apartment complex and 557-space parking garage (the "Project") with approximately 189 public spaces (the "Public Spaces"); and

WHEREAS, the Weinland Park Incentive District and the surrounding University District and Short North neighborhoods, having experienced new growth and development since the passage of the TIF Ordinance, are in need of more public parking to allow the public to access the residences, businesses, and public facilities in the area; and

WHEREAS, the Columbus-Franklin County Finance Authority is willing to issue bonds to finance the Public Spaces provided that the City and the Developer each (a) approve and enter into a Cooperative Agreement and First Amendment to Tax Increment Financing Agreement (the "Cooperative Agreement and First Amendment") with the Finance Authority pursuant to which the City agrees to pledge the Service Payments to

repayment of the bonds and the Developer agrees to subordinate its claim to the Service Payments under the Prior TIF Agreement to repayment of the bonds, and (b) execute a Declaration of public parking garage covenants (the "Declaration") which the Developer shall record against the property to secure public use of the Public Spaces for 30 years; and

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the usual daily operations of the Department of Development in that it is necessary to enter into the foregoing Cooperative Agreement and First Amendment and said Declaration to expedite the development of the Project and to secure the timely sale of bonds to finance the Public Spaces, all for the preservation of the public health, peace, property, and safety, NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

That the service payments in lieu of taxes and property tax rollback payments deposited into the Weinland Park .40(C) Municipal Public Improvement Tax Increment Equivalent Fund (Fund 7460, or the "TIF Fund") created by Ordinance No. 1799-2010, as amended by Ordinance 2918 -2021 (the "TIF Ordinance"), shall be deemed appropriated for the purposes set forth in the Cooperative Agreement and First Amendment and authorized to be expended therefrom in accordance with the Cooperative Agreement and First Amendment, and the City Auditor is authorized to make payments to the Columbus-Franklin County Finance Authority or its designee from the TIF Fund in accordance with the Cooperative Agreement and First Amendment upon order of the Director or his or her designee and that no order shall be drawn or money paid except by voucher, the form of which shall be approved by the City Auditor.
- **Section 4.** That the City Auditor is authorized to make a one-time transfer of \$10,000 and annual transfers of \$5,000 from the TIF Fund (7460) to the Business Tax Incentive Fund (2229), subject to the authorization of the Director, for the City TIF Administrative Fees in accordance with the Cooperative Agreement and First Amendment and Ordinance 3221-2018.
- Section 5. That for reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in full force from and after its

passage and approval by the Mayor or ten days after passage if the Mayor neither approves nor vetoes the same.

BACKGROUND: This legislation authorizes the Finance and Management Director to establish a Universal Term Contract (UTC) for the option to purchase Parking Meter Payment Systems with Parkeon/Flowbird. The Division of Parking Services is the sole user for parking meters. Single space, double space and multi-space kiosk parking meter systems are used to collect parking fees in designated pay to park areas in the City of Columbus. The term of the proposed option contract would be approximately five (5) years, expiring 12/31/2026 with the option to renew for two (2) additional one (1) year extensions. The Purchasing Office opened formal proposals on August 12, 2021. In addition, the expenditure of \$1.00 is hereby authorized from General Budget Reservation BRPO001670.

Proposals were evaluated by a five (5) member committee, based upon various criteria including total cost of ownership, quality and feasibility of the offered goods and services, past performance and acquisition costs resulting in an award recommendation to Parkeon/Flowbird.

BID INFORMATION: RFQ019118 was advertised and proposals were opened on August 12, 2021. Four (4) responses were received.

An evaluation committee consisting of five (5) members of Public Service provided technical expertise. Each member of the committee scored and ranked written proposals submitted by the offerors. After evaluating all product proposals, a request for a BAFO (Best and Final Offer) was requested by the top three (3) offerors. Upon review and in compliance with Columbus City Code 329, the committee submitted final rankings and was satisfied with awarding one (1) company all parking meters based on best value of the City.

Parkeon/Flowbird received the highest score with 82 total points with 100 total possible points. Based upon final scores for Parkeon/Flowbird the Committee was satisfied with awarding the offeror all parking meter items and the operating software.

The Purchasing Office is recommending award to the overall most responsive, responsible and best offeror as follows:

Parkeon/Flowbird, CC# 040030, expires 10/29/23, All Items, \$1.00 Total Estimated 2022 Expenditure: \$1,200,000.00, Division of Parking Services, the sole user.

The Division of Water is to be decreased for the following areas:

Administration - From \$1,900.00 to \$1,500.00 Field Services - from \$400.00 to \$0.00 Parsons Avenue Water Treatment Plant - from \$200.00 to \$0.00

The Revenue Reception Office section funds utilized by the cashiers were initially provided for by the Division of Water. Now that this section has been transferred under the Department of Public Utilities, Director's Office, the funds should be provided via a 4 way-split. This ordinance will authorize the City Auditor to process the necessary journal entries to reduce the Division of Water's portion and to establish the balance of the funding from the Division of Sewerage and Drainage Sanitary Operating Fund, Storm Sewer Operating Fund and the Division of Power Electricity Operating Fund as follows:

BACKGROUND: This legislation authorizes the Finance and Management Director to associate all General Budget Reservations resulting from this legislation with the appropriate Universal Term Contract Purchase Agreement established with Enforcement Video LLC dba WatchGuard Video for the purchase of Body Worn Cameras (BWC) and associated accessories for the Columbus Division of Police. These cameras will be needed for replacements with a video recording system that is typically utilized by law enforcement to record interactions with the public or gather video evidence at crime scenes.

The Finance and Management and Public Safety Departments are in the final stages of a Best Value Procurement process to select a vendor for new cameras. However, this purchase will avoid any gap of camera shortage before completing the new purchasing process.

Bid Information: The Department of Finance and Management, through RFQ001428, received and evaluated twelve (12) proposals and recommended an award be made to Enforcement Video, LLC dba WatchGuard Video. Ordinance 3078-2016, prepared by the Finance and Management Department established an option contract (UTC) with this company.

Contract Compliance: Enforcement Video, LLC dba WatchGuard Video; CC#017898 - This company is not debarred according to the Excluded Party Listing System of the Federal Government or prohibited from being awarded a contract according to the Auditor of State Unresolved Findings for Recovery Certified Search.

Emergency Designation: Emergency action is requested as funds are needed immediately to purchase said Body Worn Cameras for the Columbus Division of Police.

FISCAL IMPACT: This ordinance authorizes the expenditure of \$101,042.00 within the General Funds for the purchase of BWC and accessories for the Division of Police from the Universal Term Contract established by the Department of Finance and Management. This purchase will prevent any shortages of cameras before a new vendor is selected.

To authorize the Finance and Management Director to associate all general budget reservations resulting from this ordinance with the appropriate Universal Term Contract Purchase Agreement for the purchase of body worn cameras, accessories, and video management systems for the Division of Police; to authorize the expenditure of \$101,042.00 from the General Fund; and to declare an emergency. Explanation

This ordinance appropriates monies within the General Fund, to the various departments, commissions, and offices of the government of the City of Columbus for the twelve months ending December 31, 2022.

Emergency action is requested to allow the financial transaction to be posted in the City's accounting system as soon as possible. Up to date financial posting promotes accurate accounting and financial management. As well, this ordinance will be the subject of public hearings and is not likely to be passed by City Council until 2022. If an additional 30 days is added to the process, valuable services and programs may be affected.

Title

To make appropriations for the 12 months ending December 31, 2022, for each of the several Object Classes for which the City of Columbus has to provide from the monies known to be in the treasury of said City of Columbus, in the fund known as the General Fund, during the said 12 months from the collection of all taxes and from other sources of revenue, the amount of \$1,034,000,000.00; and to declare an emergency (\$1,034,000,000.00)

Body

WHEREAS, the matter herein provided for constitutes an emergency in that it is immediately necessary to appropriate funds to the various city departments, commissions, and offices for a 12 month period beginning January 1, 2022, and ending December 31, 2022, for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace, property, safety and welfare; Now, Therefore:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS, OHIO:

SECTION 1. That from the monies in the fund known as the "Fund for General Purposes", otherwise known as the General Fund (fund 1000), and from all monies estimated to come into said fund from any and all sources during the 12 months ending December 31, 2022, there be and hereby are appropriated to the use of the several departments, commissions and offices and Object Classes for which the corporation has to provide the following sums for use during the 12 months ending December 31, 2022:

SECTION 2. That the monies appropriated in the foregoing Section 1 shall be paid upon the order of the respective department directors or Elected Officials for which the appropriations are made except that small claims in an amount not to exceed Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) may be paid as authorized by Chapter 335 of the Columbus City Code, 1959, as amended; and except that payments or transfers between departments, divisions or funds of the City may be made by the City Auditor; and except that payments for premiums for official bonds, depository commissions, employees' hospitalization, life insurance, pensions and dental insurance shall be made on the order and approval of the Director of the Department of Finance and Management or City Auditor; and except that the monies appropriated in the foregoing Section 1, Division No. 20-01, be paid upon the order of the City Clerk or President of City Council; and that no order shall be drawn or money paid except upon voucher, the form of which shall be approved by the City Auditor.

SECTION 3. That, except in the matter of payrolls providing for the payment of the salaries of officers and employees regularly employed by the City and extraordinary emergencies, no warrant shall be issued in liquidation of vouchers, unless the department contracting the expense shall have first obtained an order duly certified that there are sufficient funds appropriated to the credit of the proper fund from which the expenditure is to be made, which certificate must be obtained prior to the incurrence of the obligation, and the head of any department or division authorized to contract expenditures will be held personally responsible for any obligation incurred contrary to the provisions of this section. Except that such certificate shall not be issued for obligations pertaining to "Capital Outlay" in programs or activities funded by federal or state categorical grants without the prior approval of the Director of the Department of Finance and Management; such prior approval must be obtained before submission of any requisition for items coded as "Capital Outlay" to the Department of Finance and Management. The Director of the Department of Finance and Management will review such requests for conformity with the approved budget.

SECTION 4. That with the exception of the provisos (reasons) established in previous sections, as stated in the reason paragraphs following each subdepartment's appropriation, it is understood that this Council is not making specific appropriations for each item of every classification hereinbefore contained but only for the total for each department and subdepartment, as shown in the final column. The itemized classification shall, however, constitute limitations on the powers of the several department heads as granted in Section 2 and no such officer shall make any expenditure for any other purpose in any amount beyond that of the particular classification, provided, however, that transfers may be made from one Object Class to another, within any one department or division. Transfer of sums exceeding \$100,000.00 shall be authorized only by ordinance of Council. Transfers of sums of \$100,000.00 or less shall only be approved pursuant to a letter over the signatures of the head of the department, the Director of the Department of Finance and Management, the City Auditor, and the Chairperson of the Committee of Finance.



To amend Chapter 251.03 of the Columbus City Health Code in regard to the food service operation and retail food establishment fees in accordance with The State of Ohio Uniform Food Safety Code, law and rules.

WHEREAS, the staff of Columbus Public Health has traditionally provided licenses and conducted inspections for all food service operations and retail food establishments within the City of Columbus; and,

WHEREAS, the staff of Columbus Public Health has completed the cost analysis calculations required by Ohio Revised Code §3717.07 Uniform Cost Methodologies; Ohio Administrative Code, Cost Analysis and Calculations §3701-21-02.2; Cost Analysis and License Fee Calculation §901:3-4-04; and,

WHEREAS, the staff of Columbus Public Health recommend the following food service operation and retail food establishment license and facility layout & equipment specification review fees to recover current costs of the food protection program; and,

WHEREAS, the Ohio Department of Agriculture recently completed a survey of the food protection program at Columbus Public Health and requires the "after-hour inspection fee" for additional inspections requested be removed from the facility layout & equipment specification review fees to recover current costs of the food protection program; and,

WHEREAS, the code establishes a new fee structure and cost methodology for establishing fees which is to go into effect

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

<u>Section 1</u>. That licensing fees established by the state methodology be adopted by the Columbus Board of Health.

Section 2. That Section 251.03(a) of the Columbus City Health Code, Approval of Plans; Fees, be amended to read as follows:



REVISED BYLAWS

of

THE NORTH LINDEN AREAS COMMISSION

Amended July 16, 2020

ARTICLE I. NAME & BOUNDARIES

All members shall be appointed by the Mayor with the concurrence of City Council.

Section 1. There is hereby created in the city of Columbus a Commission area to be known as the North Linden Area Commission, hereafter in this document referred to as the Commission.

Section 2. This area shall be bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centerline of the railroad right-of-way west of Joyce Ave. and Hudson St. and proceeding in a westerly direction along the center line of Hudson St. to the first north-south railroad right-of-way immediately east of Indianola Ave.; thence proceeding in a northerly direction along the centerline of the railroad right-of-way to Cooke Rd.; thence proceeding in an easterly direction along the centerline of Cooke Rd. to Karl Rd.; thence proceeding in a northerly direction along the centerline of Karl Rd. to Ferris Rd.; thence proceeding in an easterly direction along the centerline of Ferris Rd. to the north-south railroad right-of-way west of Joyce Ave.; thence proceeding in a southerly direction along the centerline of the railroad right-of-way to the point of beginning.

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE

Section 1. These Bylaws shall establish the proceedings by which the North Linden Area Commission shall execute its duties and functions under the grant of authority set forth in Chapter 3109 of the Columbus City Code.

Section 2. This Commission is established to afford citizen participation in the decision-making process functioning in an advisory capacity and to facilitate communication, understanding and cooperation between neighborhood groups, city officials and developers.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. There shall be maximum of 9 members of the Commission. All members shall be appointed by the mayor with concurrence of City Council.

- a) Seven (7) persons living in the Commission area shall be selected as resident members by the selection procedure outlined in Art. III, Sect. d.
- b) Two (2) members, who need not be area residents but who have shown a demonstrated interest in the area, shall be nominated by the selected members of the Commission.

- c) For selected members running for consecutive selected terms, the signatures of 25 residents within the area are not required.
- d) Except as otherwise specified, all members have equal rights.
- e) All members shall serve without compensation

Section 2. Selection, Terms, Vacancies

- a) Initially, terms shall be determined by lot with five (5) selected, two (2) nominated members and the Mayor's appointee serving for a term of three (3) years, four (4) selected and three (3) nominated serving for a term of two (2) years.
- b) Thereafter, all terms shall be for a period of three (3) years, staggered with four (4) of the commissioners' terms expiring on a given year and three (3) commissioners' terms expiring on a different year.
- c) Each term shall end on December 31 of the year the term expires.
- d) After the selection of initial Commissioners, selection of subsequent commission members shall be by residents of North Linden by petition and election.
 - i. Candidates must submit a resume, short biography, essay, and petition with signatures of at least 25 North Linden residents.
 - ii. Availability of petitions will be announced at the regular June and July meetings and published in available media.
 - iii. Petitions are due by the second Thursday in August.
 - iv. Candidates must be 18 years of age or older and be a North Linden Resident
 - v. Signers of petitions must be 18 years of age or older and be residents of North Linden.
 - vi. Petitions must contain 25 or more valid signatures for a candidate to be considered for selection.
 - vii. An election shall take place annually in the month of September.
 - a. All valid candidates, (Article III, Sect. 2d, i-vi), shall be placed on the ballot.
 - Election shall be by secret ballot. All North Linden residents and Commissioners attending the September meeting may cast a ballot.
 - viii. No election shall be scheduled if the number of candidates is less than or equal to the number of selected Commissioners with expiring terms.

- e) Any vacancies caused by death, resignation, disqualification, or by other means shall be filled for the unexpired term by appointment of the Mayor with the concurrence of Council. The area commission may recommend appointees to the Mayor to fill vacancies. Candidates for appointment must submit a resume, cover letter, essay and qualifying petition (ARTICLE III, Sect. 2d, i, iv-vi)
- f) Λ commissioner who is elected or appointed to a seat may not be elected or appointed to a different seat until the term of the seat held by the commissioner has expired.

Section 3. Expectations and Responsibilities of Commissioners

- a) No member shall represent the Commission in its official actions except as specifically authorized by a majority vote at a regular or special meeting. This shall not be construed as a restriction upon the rights of individual members to represent their own views before public or private bodies, whether in agreement or disagreement with the official actions of the Commission.
- b) Statements made by Commissioners outside of official meetings, including on social media, do not represent the Commission unless the Commissioner has been directly authorized by position or vote to represent and speak on behalf of the Commission.
- c) When presenting personal views before public or private bodies or on social media, Commissioners should clarify that they are not representing or speaking on behalf of the Commission.
- **Section 4.** If a member of the Commission selected by the selection procedures moves out of the described Commission area, such member must relinquish his or her resident status *in writing* and be replaced per Section 2e. Resignation will be officially announced at the next public meeting.

Section 5. Attendance

- a) Commissioners are required to attend all meetings of the Commission
- b) Commissioners who communicate an absence to the Chair prior to a public meeting will be deemed excused. Except for emergency, Commissioners are not permitted to have more than three (3) consecutive excused absences.
- c) Commissioners who fail to communicate absence to the Chair prior to a public meeting will be deemed un-excused. Two (2) consecutive unexcused absences from regular monthly meetings (Art. V, Sect.1) or from four (4) regular monthly meetings in a 12 month period are in violation of Sect. 5a.
- d) A Commissioner in violation of part (b) or (c) of this section will be officially removed by the Commission at the next regular meeting.

ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS

Section 1. The Officers of the Commission shall be Chair, Vice-chair, Zoning Chair, and Treasurer.

Section 2. Officers shall be elected by a majority of the Commission members present at the October monthly meeting.

Section 3. Each Officer shall be elected for a term of one (1) year, beginning January 1.

Section 4. The duties of the officers shall be:

- a) The Chair shall preside at meetings of the Commission and prepare the agenda for Commission meetings, in consultation with the other Commission members.
- b) The Vice-Chair shall perform the duties of the Chair in the Chair's absence and shall perform such special duties that may arise from time to time at the request of the Chair.
- c) The Treasurer shall receive and submit all Commissioners' requests with receipts for reimbursement; and shall receive and disburse all funds of the Commission.

Section 5. The Vice-Chair shall fill a vacancy in the Chair position. A vacancy in every other position shall be filled by election by a majority of the Commission members present at the subsequent monthly meeting. A vacancy filled for six (6) months or more shall be considered full term.

Section 6. Election of officers shall be by roll call.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

7) 100 A 4/13 So 08/15/2020 Section 1. Regular Meetings

- a) Regular meetings shall be on the third Thursday of each month at a stated time to be determined by two-thirds vote of the Commission and shall be open to the public. Regular meetings shall commence no later than 15 minutes after the stated time.
- b) The first regular meeting in January shall be the Annual Meeting at which time the new Commissioners shall take office, officers shall be elected by roll call (Article IV, Section 6) and annual reports from committees will be received.
- c) A regular meeting may be cancelled, or the meeting date changed, by a two-thirds vote of the Commission.

Section 2. Special Meetings

- a) Special meetings may be called by the Chair or by a majority of members present in a regular or special meeting or by the Chair at the written request of at least five (5) members.
- b) Written notice of any special meeting shall be given to each Commission member and the public at least seven (7) days in advance, except in an emergency. This written notice shall specify the date, time, and place of the meeting and describe all business to be conducted at the meeting.

- c) No business shall be conducted at a special meeting unless it was included in the notice of the special meeting.
- d) Special meetings shall be open to the public.

Section 3. Quorums

A quorum shall be defined as greater than 50% of the Commission members. A majority of the Commission members present and voting shall be required to approve a motion, except as otherwise provided.

Section 4. The business of the Commission shall contain the following unless otherwise directed by a majority of members present:

Scheduled speakers
Reports of standing committees (Old and New Business)
Reports of special committees (Old and New Business)
Reports from Neighborhood Organizations

Section 5. The Chair may recognize members of the public who wish to address the Commission and have turned in speaker slips concerning issues under discussion and on the agenda a) If a member of the public wishes to be included on the Agenda, the person must contact the

Chair. In turn, the Chair will inform the Commission.

b) The member of the public must state their name and the issue to be presented.

c) A uniform time limit for such presentations may be set by the Chair.

Section 6. Issues brought before the Commission that are not under discussion, nor on the Agenda may be discussed or tabled by a vote of a show of hands so that proper authorities can be consulted.

Section 7. When guests are invited to speak to the Commission the time will generally be limited to fifteen (15) minutes or at the discretion of the Chair.

Section 8. Dissenting or non-concurring Committee member's reports may be filed by Commission or committee members and shall be attached to the Standing and Special Committees' reports.

Section 9. Commission meetings shall be limited to not more than three (3) hours unless deemed appropriate and approved by a majority of the Commission members present.

Section 10. Except as otherwise specified, meetings of the Commission shall be conducted in an orderly and reasonable manner using the latest current revision of Robert's Rules of Order as a guide.

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a) Voting shall take place by a show of hands

b) At the request of any Commissioner, a roll call vote may be granted.

ARTICLE VI. COMMITTEES

Section 1. Appointment of Commission members to both standing and special committees shall be made by the Chair in consultation with Commission members and shall be subject to the approval of a majority of the Commission members.

Section 2. Each standing committee may appoint persons who are not Commissioners as committee members, subject to the approval by the Commission. All committee members have voting privileges within that committee. Non-commissioners may or may not outnumber Commissioners on any standing committee.

Section 3. Each committee shall select a member to Chair the committee, and may select other Officers and adopt internal rules necessary to carry out their assigned task. The selected Chair of any committee shall be a Commissioner.

- a) The selected Chair of any committee may be requested to step down as the Chair of that committee by the Commission Chair. The selected Chair of any committee may be voted out as the Chair of that committee by a two-thirds majority vote of the Commission.
- b) Voting by the entire Commission, for the purpose of removing a selected Chair of a committee shall be conducted at a Special Meeting of the Commission.
- c) At any time before voting by the entire Commission, for the purpose of removing a selected Chair, the selected chair may resign the chair.
- d) Leaving the committee is the decision of the individual. If the individual remains on the committee, the individual shall not publicly represent the committee or the Commission in a position of authority with regard to that committee or any of that committee's functions. The individual is an internal member only on that committee.
- **Section 4.** A special committee may be established or dissolved by a majority vote of the Commission. Its size, powers and duties shall be specified by the creating resolution.

Section 5. All committee meetings must be publicized by sending the date, location, time and agenda to the Department of Neighborhoods at least 7 days in advance for submission to the city bulletin.

Section 6. The Chair of the Commission shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.

Section 7. The standing committees and their responsibilities are:

a) Executive Committee

1. Consists of Chair, Vice-Chair, Zoning Chair, and Treasurer;

2. Prepare the agenda of regular meetings; plan the direction and scope of Commission activities;

3. Review finances and policies.

b) Planning & Development Committee

1. Review & recommend long-range plans for the North Linden Area;

2. Investigate funding for implementation of such plans;

3. Develop methods for involving the citizens in such planning;

4. Maintain planning files.

c) Zoning Committee

Receive, review and make recommendations concerning applications for rezoning, zoning variances, demolitions and special permits for property located in the area.

d) Community Engagement Committee

- 1. Review social and recreation services in the area and take appropriate action to improve or maintain them;
- 2. Monitor consumer business relations in the area;
- 3. Initiate, coordinate or assist at community-wide events;

Work to develop a community identity;

5. Work to improve the quality of life for all our residents;

6. Publicize the North Linden Area Commission as a community resource.

e) Health & Safety Committee

1. Coordinate and/or initiate efforts to reduce crime in the community. Work with other groups as desired;

2. Initiate and/or help with efforts to maintain a clean community;

3. Initiate and/or assist with efforts to control conditions which interfere with the health of residents.

4. Sub-committee - Code Enforcement

 Report known code violations in the North Linden Area Commission area to the appropriate Code Enforcement officer of the City of Columbus;

b. Become knowledgeable about code enforcement problems in the community and make constructive suggestions about remedying them; and

c. The Committee may undertake programs to educate the community about code enforcement issues.

f) Job Creation and Workforce Development

1. Providing opportunities for entrepreneurship;

2. Partnering with businesses to offer employment.

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- 3. Sub-Committee Education
 - a. Linking business owners and educators;
 - b. Promoting training for employees.

g) Transportation Committee

Initiate and/or assist with efforts to alleviate vehicular traffic problems in the community

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ARTICLE VII. CODE OF CONDUCT

Commissioners have an obligation to limit comments from litigious content that jeopardizes the NLAC. If comments are deemed harmful, by the NLAC, to any member of the Public and/or the NLAC, then the offending Commissioner must issue a public statement for the record at the subsequent NLAC meeting. This statement must include reference to the offense and indicate that her/his opinions and comments were personal and had no bearing on the NLAC.

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS

Section 1. A proposed amendment to these Bylaws shall be submitted in writing by any Commission member at any regular meeting.

- a) The proposed amendment shall first be read at the regular meeting when submitted and again at the next two (2) regular meetings following. The proposed amendment shall be voted on after the reading at the third regular meeting.
- b) With a unanimous vote of the Commission members present at the first reading, the proposed amendment may be voted on at the next regular meeting.
- c) Adoption of the proposed amendment shall be by a two-thirds majority vote of the entire Commission.

Section 2. In accordance with Chapter 3109 of the Columbus City Code, the approved amendment shall be filed immediately with the Department of Neighborhoods after its adoption. Such amendment shall take effect thirty (30) days after publication in the City Bulletin.



RENEWAL OF PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY DECLARATION

In response to the community health crisis surrounding COVID-19/Coronavirus and pursuant to Chapter 775 of the Columbus City Health Code, Chapter 3709 of the Ohio Revised Code, and the contract between Columbus Public Health and the City of Worthington, Resolution No. 20-08, a declaration of Public Health Emergency (PHE), to include the cities of Columbus and Worthington, was passed and issued by the Columbus Board of Health on March 13, 2020.

That declaration automatically terminated on April 12, 2020.

On March 17, 2020, pursuant to Chapter 775 of the Columbus City Health Code and Chapter 3709 of the Ohio Revised Code, Resolution No. 20-09, authorizing the Health Commissioner to declare a public health emergency without convening the Board of Health, was passed by the Columbus Board of Health.

Previous renewals by the Health Commissioner of the original Board of Health PHE declaration issued on March 13, 2020 have expired.

The most recent renewal issued Thursday 10/21/21 will expire at 11:59pm on Friday 11/19/21.

Due to the ongoing community health emergency related to COVID-19 in the cities of Columbus and Worthington; specifically, the high level of community transmission of the Delta variant, lower than desired vaccination rates, and significant case numbers, hospitalizations, and deaths, and pursuant to the authority granted in Columbus Board of Health Resolution No. 20-09, Chapter 775 of the Columbus Health Code Chapter, and Chapter 3709 of the Ohio Revised Code:

I hereby order:

Renewal of the Public Health Emergency declaration for the cities of Columbus and Worthington initially issued by the Columbus Board of Health on March 13, 2020. Unless amended or rescinded, this renewal shall be in effect from 12:00am on Saturday 11/20/21 until 11:59pm on Sunday 12/19/21.

This renewal of the PHE declaration shall supersede and take precedence over every prior renewal.
