



WHEREAS, Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month (DDAM) is a nationwide event to raise awareness about inclusion of people with developmental disabilities in all aspects of community life, and the barriers that people with disabilities still face.

WHEREAS, during the Month of March, National Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month seeks to increase public awareness of the needs and the potential of Americans who face developmental disabilities and to provide the opportunities they need in order to live productive lives; and

WHEREAS, 1963: President John F Kennedy signed the law that would eventually be known as the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act (DD Act). Originating as an amendment, this bill was the first major piece of legislation to combat mental illness and intellectual disabilities; and

WHEREAS, 1970: President Kennedy's amendment was expanded and renamed. It became known as the Developmental Disabilities Services and Facilities Construction Amendment of 1970, making this the first law to introduce the term "developmental disability; and

WHEREAS, 1975: This law became the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act in 1975 and was amended several times in the next decade. The 1975 amendment demonstrated a significant shift away from institutionalization and toward independence, as it introduced language requiring "habilitation in the least restrictive setting that maximizes developmental potential" and specified that public funds should not be provided; and

WHEREAS, this annual recognition was established in 1987 by President Ronald Reagan. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, developmental disabilities are defined as impairments in physical, learning, language, or behavior areas, which include Autism spectrum disorders, Cerebral Palsy, attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder, intellectual or learning disabilities, hearing loss, vision impairment, and other developmental delays; and

WHEREAS, we value what is important to people with disabilities and their families who are striving for everyday lives no different than that of all other citizens; now therefore,

Background: This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to enter into contract with KNS Services, Inc. (KNS) for continued security camera services and equipment in accordance with the sole source procurement provisions of City Code Chapter 329. The contract amount being authorized by this ordinance is \$102,000.00.

KNS has provided surveillance system installation and repair for the department for many years. They also service many other city departments including Public Safety, Finance, and Public Utilities. They have established a unique relationship with the Department of Technology to provide robust service to multiple departments in the city. The City of Columbus selected the Genetec software platform years ago for all departments to utilize for their surveillance systems with the vision of aggregating these services citywide. This effort has resulted in KNS becoming the provider of these services for several departments as Genetec requires the equipment to be

maintained by KNS Services to avoid a situation where multiple vendors are given security clearance to access and make changes to the system.

The Recreation and Parks Department owns 55 unique surveillance systems comprised of 508 cameras around the city. The Genetec platform provides remote viewing, access management, and organizational integration. In the past we have had several staff involved in keeping these systems monitored and repaired, in addition to the contracted help of KNS. The task has simply become too great for our staff to keep up with and we need professional help in the way of system function checks and priority service response. This contract accomplishes that by have KNS personnel do system function checks on our systems twice weekly, immediately dispatching repairs on no-functioning components of the system as they are discovered. While Recreation and Parks site managers will continue to keep an eye on their systems and report issues that arise, the new arrangement with KNS will allow for greater efficiencies. The contract will help keep and down time for security and surveillance to a minimum, making our sites safer for staff and visitors.

This contract not only gets a quicker response time for repairs, but also gains access to a 24/7 emergency response in the event of a serious crime or occurrence. If the system is having issues of recall or playback, these are frequently network and/or hardware issues that require a trained technician to pull up video history. In addition, this contract will establish a more robust stock of cameras, digital recording units, switches, and equipment for immediate deployment and will improve our security system overall. We have had instances where delays in receiving replacement components have resulted in systems being inoperable for weeks. Having the replacement equipment available immediately will minimize these extended downtimes. This contract includes \$52,000.00 to cover the cost of these services, billed monthly, as well as \$50,000.00 for new security equipment to replace failing components, for a total contract of \$102,000.00.

The purpose of this legislation is to authorize the Director of Public Utilities to renew an annual service agreement with Arcadis U.S., Inc. for the Orion Project Management Information System Support Services application for use by the Departments of Public Utilities, Finance, Development, Public Service, and Recreation and Parks. The Orion Project Management Information System (PMIS) is a web-based electronic project management system to facilitate supervision and administration of projects, contracts, tasks, budget, and schedules along with construction documents such as Submittals, Requests for Information, Request for Proposals, and Pay Applications via the Construction Management side of the program. PMIS support services and upgrade enhancements are ongoing and additional funding has been provided as modification to prior contracts. The agreement for this service will be established in accordance with the pertinent provisions for Sole Source Procurement of Chapter 329 of the Columbus City Code.

The City of Columbus began using a software solution for capital project management under the Professional Program Management contract for the Department of Public Utilities' Wet Weather Program in 2006. PMIS was highly effective, and the City determined that expanded use of PMIS could potentially benefit other divisions within the Department of Public Utilities and other City departments as well. A consultant, Red Oak, was retained to assist the City in assessing its current interim PMIS, and providing a decision framework for determining how best to expand use of such a system city-wide. The PMIS assessment project consisted of engaging with City stakeholders, clarifying goals, determining functional and technical requirements for PMIS, and performing initial analysis of potential software solutions. From a list of approximately 30 different solutions, Red Oak performed a screening process and identified four solutions that met City requirements. The City invited vendors to make software demonstrations and preliminary cost proposals. From this information, the City was able to determine that the current PMIS, developed by Malcolm-Pirnie (now Arcadis U.S., Inc.) could be cost-effectively expanded to serve the needs of both the Department of Public Utilities and other departments city-wide.

This contract renewal is for one year from the date of execution, with the option to renew annually based upon mutual agreement, budgeted funds, and approval by City Council.

BACKGROUND: The Ohio Department of Development recently issued the Building Demolition and Site Revitalization Program which will provide the county with funds to demolish blighted residential and commercial The Central Ohio Community Improvement Corporation (COCIC) is the designated grantee for Franklin County and will receive an initial allocation of \$500,000.00. Additional funds are available with a 25% This legislation authorizes the Director of the Department of Development to enter into contracts and spend up to \$800,000.00 for various expenditures related to the demolition of blighted structures for both the grant and other demolitions under the land bank program. Work includes demolition, environmental testing, environmental abatement, post demolition lot restoration, costs related to acquisition and tax foreclosure, grants to third parties for demolitions, and similar activities. The contracts will be established through COCIC or in Authority to waive accordance with the competitive bidding provisions of the Columbus City Codes. competitive bidding under City Code Chapter 329 is requested for situations where the immediate demolition of structures is necessary to comply with a Building Order issued by the Department of Building and Zoning Services.

Emergency action is requested in order demolish the structures as soon as possible as they may pose public nuisance or risk to public health and safety.

FISCAL IMPACT: This ordinance authorizes an expenditure of \$800,000.00 in the Development Taxable Bonds Fund. It is necessary to certify the requisite funds in the amount of \$800,000.00 against the Special Income Tax Fund. An amendment to the 2021 Capital Improvement Budget is required to establish sufficient budget authority within the proper project.

To amend the 2021 Capital Improvement Budget; to authorize the City Auditor to appropriate and transfer funds from the Special Income Tax to the Development Taxable Bond Fund; to authorize the Director of the Department of Development to enter into contracts with the Central Ohio Community Improvement Corporation (COCIC) and/or various companies and non-profit entities to provide services related to the demolition of structures, including environmental/asbestos testing and abatement, demolition, post-demolition lot restoration, legal fees related to tax foreclosures, acquisition of blighted properties, and similar services; to waive the competitive bidding provisions of City Code Chapter 329 for emergency demolitions; to authorize the expenditure of \$800,000.00 from the Development Taxable Bonds Fund; and to declare an emergency. WHEREAS, it has become necessary to enter into contracts and provide funds for deconstruction, demolition, asbestos abatement, and post-demolition lot restoration services for structures that are not eligible for funding and provide matching funds for the under the State Program; and

WHEREAS, all expenditures from this project, will be accomplished pursuant to the competitive bidding provisions of City Code Chapter 329, establishing Purchase Orders with COCIC to hire demolition and abatement firms, or by providing grants to third parties for the purposes of proving matching funds for the State Program; and

This legislation will authorize the Director of Finance and Management, on behalf of the Department of Technology, for the City Attorney's Office, to establish a purchase order for the continued conversion of legal documents via backfile scanning and electronic signature process capabilities with 3SG Plus, LLC. This purchase is being done through the utilization of State of Ohio, State Term Schedule contract STS033, # 534577, with an expiration date of 6/30/2023. The City Attorney's Office requires the ability to automate processing and store information related to legal matters assigned to their office. 1. BACKGROUND

This ordinance authorizes the Director of Public Service to modify a professional services contract with IPS Group, Inc., to extend the current Parking Meter Systems contract for one year with the option of two additional one year term extensions. It also authorizes adding additional funding to the contract.

Ordinance 1041-2010 authorized the execution of the original contract, providing the City with the ability to replace its entire inventory of over 4,000 parking meters, which had exceeded their designed service life, and allowed for expansion of the meter program. The contract terms included fixed costs for the parking meters and related services over the five-year contract period and were subject to the availability of funding and the approval of City Council. Ordinance 0582-2015 renewed the contract and extended the expiration to September 30, 2020. Ordinance 1217-2018 extended the contract term until March 31, 2021. Ordinance 0850-2020 added to the scope of services to include additional data collection requirements and provided funding for the annual meter management system as established under the contract, which currently expires March 31, 2021. Ordinance 2120-2020 added additional funding for the annual meter management system as established under the contract, which currently expires March 31, 2022.

This contract modification will provide a one year extension of the existing contract from the date of execution to March 31, 2023, with the option of renewing the contract for two additional one year terms and will provide funding for the annual meter management system (\$400,000.00) as established under the contract. The management, equipment, and support for the City's entire parking meter system is proprietary to IPS Group, Inc, meeting the sole source procurement provision of City Code Chaper 329. Future contracts and modifications shall be subject to approved appropriations and City Council approval.

BACKGROUND: The Office of CelebrateOne received funding from The Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services to develop a culturally-informed digital media advertising campaign that promotes safe sleep practices and neighborhood initiatives focused on teen health education. To complete the deliverables of this grant, CelebrateOne will contract with The Saunders Company LLC, Nationwide Children's Hospital and

Planned Parenthood of Greater Ohio in the total amount of \$647,414.91 for the period of October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022.

The Saunders Company LLC contract in the amount of \$330,000.00 will develop a culturally -informed media advertising campaign that promotes safe sleep practices and to increase enrollment in home visiting services. These services were advertised through Bonfire (RFQ14474) according to bidding requirements of the City Code.

The Planned Parenthood of Greater Ohio sub-award agreement in the amount of \$167,414.91 will continue a community based peer to peer education program for teens to develop healthy lifestyles and responsible choices by adolescents. Peer educators will receive training and incentives to increase their knowledge of essential, evidence based sexual health information, establish important leadership skills and gain confidence to engage their peers and larger community in vital conversations. These services were advertised through Bonfire (RFQ015529) according to bidding requirements of the City Code.

The Nationwide Children's Hospital sub-award agreement in the amount of \$150,000.00 will support the CelebrateOne goal to improve reproductive health planning by implementing evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programming in schools. The continuation of this program has been ongoing since 2019 within selected Columbus City Schools. This ordinance waives relevant competitive bidding provisions of the Columbus City Code.

In 2018, more Franklin County babies lived to celebrate their first birthday and the infant mortality rate dropped across the populations. Infant mortality is a key indicator of a community's overall well-being. There was a 23% decrease in the infant mortality rate since 2011, from 9.6 to 7.5 per 1,000 live births.

This ordinance is submitted as an emergency to ensure the grant deliverables are met within the required timeline.

FISCAL IMPACT: This contract is entirely funded by the grant award from the Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services by Ordinance 3056-2021.

To authorize the Executive Director, Office of CelebrateOne, to enter into contract and sub-award agreements with Saunders Company LLC, Nationwide Children's Hospital, and Planned Parenthood of Greater Ohio for a culturally-informed media advertising campaign and teen peer-to-peer reproductive health education in the amount of \$647,414.91; to authorize the expenditure of \$647,414.91 from the General Government Grants Fund ;to waive the competitive bidding provisions of the Columbus City Code; and to declare an emergency. (\$647,414.91)

WHEREAS, CelebrateOne has received funding from the Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services to develop a culturally-informed digital media advertising campaign that promotes safe sleep practices and to provide teen peer to peer reproductive health education; and

Replacement of these water lines will improve water service, decrease burden on water maintenance operations, and reduce water loss. Background: This ordinance is to transfer and appropriate \$173,000.00 from the existing Hotel/Motel Tax appropriation to the Recreation and Parks Department for support of music licensing for various annual festivals and cultural arts programming produced for the enrichment of the community; and for the Special Events

Support Program, originally known as the Partnership through Sponsorship program.

The Partnership through Sponsorship Program was created in 1995 by City Council to support community groups and neighbors that host free events that celebrate cultural, ethnic, and artistic diversity for the entertainment and enjoyment by the greater Columbus community. In 2017, CRPD elected to expand the program to include larger city-wide events that are part of the cultural fabric of the City. Now identified as the Special Events Support Program, it includes (5) levels of support including: First Time Impact, Neighborhood Impact, Community Impact, Citywide Impact, and Regional Impact. All events must occur within a Columbus park, facility, street, or public place.

Emergency Justification: Emergency action is requested as it is immediately necessary to transfer and appropriate funds for necessary expenditures starting in March.

Financial Impact: The City Auditor is directed to transfer and appropriate \$173,000.00 from the Hotel/Motel Tax Fund to the Recreation and Parks Operating Fund as stated on the attached funding template.

To authorize the transfer of \$173,000.00 from the Hotel/Motel Tax Fund to the Recreation and Parks Operating Fund for the support of music licensing and the Partnership through Sponsorship program; to appropriate \$173,000.00 in the Recreation and Parks Operating Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$173,000.00)

WHEREAS, Columbus City Code Section 371.02 allows for the allocation of a maximum of 1.59 percent in relation to the 5.1 percent Hotel/Motel Tax receipts for use for said purpose of the advancement of the cultural development of the community - the equivalent of 31.18 percent of collections; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Recreation and Parks annually provides a portion of this allocation to support regional, citywide, and community events and festivals; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to authorize the transfer and appropriation of \$173,000.00 to the Department of Recreation and Parks to support various cultural events; and

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the Department of Recreation and Parks in that it is immediately necessary to transfer and appropriate funds for necessary expenditures starting in late March; NOW, THEREFORE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

SECTION 1. That the City Auditor be and is hereby authorized and directed to transfer \$173,000.00 from the Hotel/Motel Tax Fund, 2231, to the Recreation and Parks Operating Fund, 2285.

SECTION 2. That from the unappropriated monies in the Recreation and Parks Department operating fund, 2285, and from all monies estimated to come into said fund from any and all sources and unappropriated for any other purpose during the fiscal year ending December 31, 2022, the sum of \$173,000.00 is hereby appropriated.

SECTION 3. That the funds necessary to carry out the purpose of this ordinance are hereby deemed appropriated, and the City Auditor shall establish such accounting codes as necessary.

SECTION 4. That for the reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor, or ten (10) days after passage if the Mayor neither approves nor vetoes the same.

This legislation authorizes the Executive Director of the Mayor's Office of Education to enter into a contract with Future Ready Columbus to develop and implement a public relations campaign to recruit students for enrollment in the new Hilltop Early Learning Center. Future Ready Columbus, a public/private organization focused on supporting a prenatal to age five approach to education in Franklin County, has much experience in community engagement.

Mayor Ginther's vision for America's Opportunity City is that every child in Columbus enters kindergarten ready to learn. Becoming kindergarten-ready is about so much more than participating in a quality early learning program. Children who come to school ready to learn are more likely to succeed academically and in life. Ample evidence shows that children who enter school unprepared and who get a poor start in their earliest years are more likely to struggle throughout school and subsequently, fail to graduate. An investment in early childhood development helps prevent achievement gaps, reduces the need for special education, increases the likelihood of healthier lifestyles, lowers the crime rate and reduces overall social costs.

Strategies that assist children to successfully transition to kindergarten focus on serving the needs of the whole child and their families. Screenings that identify developmental delays early, along with referrals and rehabilitative services, are crucial in meeting educational goals. Home-visitation or center-based education and advocacy programs provide important information to family members on the early developmental needs of their child. For children and families that have experienced trauma and toxic stresses, mental and behavioral health, and counselling services are necessary. In addition, meeting the basic needs of the family, such as having access to fresh fruits and vegetables, stable housing, employment, childcare, and transportation are important for the success of the entire family.

In 2017 Mayor Ginther created the Hilltop Early Childhood Partnership (HECP) and charged the partnership with doubling the number of Hilltop children enrolled in quality early programs in this community. At that time, a review had showed that there were far fewer children enrolled in quality early learning programs in the Hilltop than anywhere else in the city. One of the recommendations in the HECP's 2018 report was to build a new early learning center in the Hilltop to increase capacity and provide quality programming.

Ordinance 0441-2022, recently passed by City Council, authorizes the City to contract with Columbus Early Learning Centers to serve as master tenant of the new Hilltop center and provides funds for start-up work. This ordinance builds on that work.

This contract is being awarded pursuant to Chapter 329 of the City Code, which allows for the City to negotiate not-for-profit service contracts. This organization was selected due to their experience in early education initiatives and community engagement. This contract is being awarded to Future Ready Columbus as the Office of Education has neither the expertise nor the capacity to execute this work.

FISCAL IMPACT: Funding for this contract (\$150,000.00) is available within the 2022 Mayor's Office of Education general fund budget.

EMERGENCY ACTION is requested so that this contract can be entered into immediately to allow Future Ready Columbus to develop and implement a public relations campaign to recruit students for the new center in time for this coming school year.

To authorize the Mayor's Office of Education to enter into a non-for-profit service contract with Future Ready Columbus to develop and implement a public relations campaign to recruit students for enrollment in the new Hilltop Early Learning Center; to authorize the expenditure of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000.00) from the General Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$150,000.00)

WHEREAS, the Mayor's vision for Columbus, America's Opportunity City, is that all children enter kindergarten ready to learn; and

WHEREAS, data shows that children who participate in quality early education programs, notably in Columbus' Early Start Columbus program, are better prepared to start school; and

WHEREAS, the Hilltop Early Childhood Partnership recommended a new early learning center be constructed in the Hilltop to increase the availability of quality pre-kindergarten programs for Hilltop children; and

WHEREAS, the Center, with a capacity of 240 children, is being constructed at 45 Clarendon Avenue, Columbus, Ohio 43223; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the City and the Hilltop community to enroll as many children as possible at the Center; and

BACKGROUND: In 2005 the Northland Alliance, the Morse Road SID Exploratory Committee, and the City of Columbus Development Department initiated an effort with property owners on Morse Road from Indianola Avenue to Cleveland Avenue to create a Special Improvement District (SID). In 2006 the Morse Road SID was created for a term of ten (10) years. On March 14, 2016 a petition to reauthorize for another ten (10) years

was accepted and approved by Columbus City Council by Ordinance No. 0611- 2016. Another action required by the Ohio Revised Code is the approval of the Plan of Improvements and Services and the inclusion of City owned property in said plan. This legislation was approved by Columbus City Council by Resolution No. 0043X-2016, passed March 21, 2016. The third piece of legislation was to declare the necessity to implement the Plan of Services adopted by the Morse Road Special Improvement District of Columbus, Inc., and to levy a special assessment for the services. This legislation was approved by Columbus City Council by Resolution No. 0098X-2016, passed May 2, 2016. A final piece of legislation, providing for the levy of assessment to property owners, was approved by City Council by Ordinance No. 1579-2016, passed June 20, 2016. Each assessment is to be returned to the SID for operational requirements as set forth in the District Plan.

This legislation appropriates and approves the expenditure of assessments collected in fiscal year 2022 that are to be returned to the SID. This legislation also allows the Director of Development to enter into a contract with the Morse Road Special Improvement District of Columbus, Inc. for disbursement of these funds in 2022.

BACKGROUND: Chapter 1710 of the Ohio Revised Code, effective September 29, 1994 provides for the creation of Special Improvement Districts (SIDs), by non-profit corporations governed by trustees elected by the property owners for the provision of special services in a designated district. In 2017 a petition to create a new SID was approved by Council. The property owners initiated a one petition process in which the owners of at least 60% of the front footage of all real property located within in the East Main Street area between Bexley and Whitehall, acknowledging that they are interested in the creation of a Special Improvement District and they approve of the Plan for Improvements and Services to be provided by the East Main Street SID. This petition was accepted and approved by Columbus City Council by Ordinance 0765-2017, passed March 27, 2017. Another action required by the Ohio Revised Code is the approval of the Plan for Improvements and Services in said plan. This legislation was approved by Columbus City Council by Resolution No. 0071X-2017, passed April 3, 2017. The third piece of legislation was to declare the necessity to implement the Plan of Services adopted by the East Main Street SID, and to levy a special assessment for the services. This legislation was approved by Columbus City Council by Resolution No. 0147X-2017, passed May 15, 2017. A final piece of legislation, providing for the levy of assessment to property owners, was approved by City Council by Ordinance No. 1608-2017, passed July 10, 2017 for a 5-year term from January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2022. Each assessment is to be returned to the SID for operational requirements as set forth in the District Plan.

This legislation appropriates and approves the expenditure of assessments collected in Fiscal Year 2022 that are to be returned to the SID. This legislation also allows the Director of Development to enter into a contract with the East Main Street Special Improvement District of Columbus, Inc. for disbursement of these funds in 2022.

FISCAL IMPACT: Funds for this expenditure will be received from the levy of assessments collected from property owners in the East Main Street Special Improvement District. These funds are deposited into and expended from Agency Fund 3313.

BACKGROUND: Chapter 1710 of the Ohio Revised Code, effective September 29, 1994 provides for the creation of Special Improvement Districts (SID), by non-profit corporations governed by trustees elected by the property owners for the provision of special services in a designated district. In 2015 a petition to create a new SID in the University area to be known as the University District Special Improvement District (District) was approved by Council for a 5-year term. In 2020 members of the SID approved a reauthorization to continue SID services. The property owners initiated a one petition process in which the owners of at least 60% of the area of all real property located within the District signed, acknowledging that they supported the reauthorization of the Special Improvement District and they approve of the Base Plan for Public Services and Improvements to be provided by the University District SID. This petition was accepted and approved by Columbus City Council by Ordinance 0800-2020, passed May 4, 2020, for a 5-year term. BACKGROUND:

The City of Columbus, Columbus Public Health, receives funding for the Ryan White Part A HIV Care Grant Program from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA). The purpose of this grant is to improve access to quality medical care for persons with HIV or AIDS living in Central Ohio (Franklin, Licking, Delaware, Morrow, Union, Madison, Pickaway, and Fairfield counties). The goal is that each client will achieve viral suppression, which improves their quality of life and reduces the risk of spreading the infection.

In 2020 the RWPA program for the Central Ohio area served 2,397 people living with HIV through programs including outpatient/ambulatory medical care, mental health services, medical case management, early intervention services, housing services, non-medical case management, emergency financial assistance and medical transportation.

This ordinance authorizes the Board of Health to enter into and, if needed, modify contracts with the following vendors to provide HIV-related somatic and outpatient/ambulatory medical care, early intervention services, medical and non-medical case management services, medical transportation, mental health services, housing services, emergency financial assistance, and any other service allowable under the grant. The term of the contract with each qualified vendor is March 1, 2022, through February 28, 2023, with funding based on vendor estimates of annual funding requirements for allowable services. These services were advertised through vendor services RFQ010425 on August 25, 2018 and RFQ013649 on September 24, 2019, according to bidding

requirements of the City Code.

Background: Pulte Homes of Ohio, LLC and Harmony Development Group, LLC (together, the

"Developers") purchased or have options to purchase ±369.2 acres within Columbus near the intersection of Alton & Darby Creek Road and Renner Road (the "Developers' Property") in order to construct the "Sugar Farm" and "Renner South" residential developments in addition to public infrastructure improvements serving both of these areas. Pursuant to Ordinance 1557-2020, the Director of the Department of Development entered into the "Big Darby - Sugar Farm and Renner South Plan Agreement" dated March 10, 2021 with the Developers to outline the plans and respective commitments of the City and the Developers for the fulfillment of the "Big Darby Revenue Program" requirements as established by Resolution 0216X-2008, including but not limited to, establishing a new community authority ("NCA") and new tax increment financing ("TIFs"). Resolution 0118X-2021 and Resolution 0243X-2021 established the Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA ("SFRS NCA") according to Ohio Revised Code ("ORC") Chapter 349 as a body politic and corporate within the boundaries of the Developers' Property. The Developers and the City agreed the SFRS NCA would impose 6.5 mills on the Developers' Property for thirty years. The NCA charges received from the 6.5 mills by the SFRS NCA will be allocated first to provide an allowance to cover administrative costs of the SFRS NCA, and the remaining balance (the "Available Charge Revenue") will be used for public infrastructure improvements. Ordinance 3248-2021 established a new 30-year, 95% TIF area pursuant to ORC Section 5709.40(B) for the part of Sugar Farm including parcel number 203-304335 (the "Sugar Farm 40(B) TIF"). Following approval, pursuant to Ordinance 3319-2021, of the "County Compensation Agreement" with Franklin County required by ORC Section 5709.40(E), Ordinance 3259-2021 established two new 30-year, 95% TIF incentive districts pursuant to ORC Section 5709.40(C) for the remaining area of Sugar Farm (the "Sugar Farm Incentive District") and for all of Renner South (the "Renner South Incentive District"). Service payments in lieu of taxes from these three TIFs (the "Service Payments") will be first distributed by the county to the Hilliard City Schools and Tolles Career and Technical Center, and then, to the appropriate taxing authorities as required by ORC Section 5709.40(F). The remaining portion of the Service Payments will be distributed to the City for deposit into new TIF funds to use for compensating Norwich Township (the "Township") and for public infrastructure improvements.

In order to implement the Big Darby Revenue Program and the Big Darby - Sugar Farm and Renner South Plan Agreement, this Ordinance will authorize the City to enter into: 1) the "Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement" with the SFRS NCA in order for the City to accept the Available Charge Revenue for deposit into a new NCA fund, 2) the "Township Compensation Agreement" with the Township to provide it Service Payments equivalent to the amount of property taxes it would have received from its levies that are not otherwise directly available to the Township's fire department and emergency medical services under ORC Section 5709.40, and 3) the "TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement" with the Developers to provide them reimbursement for eligible costs of public infrastructure improvements using the Available Charge Revenue and the remaining Service Payments after the City has first made payment to the Township (the "Available TIF Revenue").

This Ordinance will also appropriate and authorize the expenditure of the Service Payments to the Township as well as appropriate and authorize the expenditure of the Available Charge Revenue and the Available TIF Revenue to the Developers pursuant to the respective terms and conditions of the Township Compensation Agreement and the TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement. It is contemplated that Pulte Homes of Ohio, LLC will receive the Available Charge Revenue and the Available TIF Revenues generated from Sugar Farm, and Harmony Development Group, LLC will receive the Available Charge Revenue and Available TIF Revenues from Renner South for reimbursement of each of the Developers' respective costs of the public infrastructure improvements plus their corresponding accrued interest on those costs.

Emergency Justification: Emergency legislation is required to allow for the immediate effectiveness of this

ordinance, which is necessary to enable the immediate execution of the agreements contemplated herein to provide for the timely financing and redevelopment of the above described public infrastructure improvements already in process.

<u>Fiscal Impact</u>: No funding is required for this legislation. The City is appropriating and authorizing the expenditure of its received community development charges generated by the parcels in the Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA and the service payments in lieu of taxes generated by the parcels in the Sugar Farm 40(B) TIF, Sugar Farm Incentive District, and Renner South Incentive District, that are to be deposited in each new herein described NCA fund and TIF Funds, all in accordance with the Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement, Township Compensation Agreement, and the TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement.

To authorize the Director of the Department of Development to execute and deliver the: 1) Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement between the City and Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA, 2) Township Compensation Agreement between the City and Norwich Township; and 3) TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement between the City, Pulte Homes of Ohio, LLC, and Harmony Development Group, LLC, all for the benefit of implementing the Big Darby Revenue Program; to establish the Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA Fund; to authorize the City Auditor to accept the community development charges from the Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA and to deposit said funds into the Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA Fund pursuant to the Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement; to appropriate and authorize the expenditure of the service payments in lieu of taxes generated by the parcels subject to the Sugar Farm 40(B) TIF, Sugar Farm Incentive District, and Renner South Incentive District ordinances deposited in the Sugar Farm 40(B) TIF, Sugar Farm Incentive District, and Renner South Incentive District Municipal Public Improvement Tax Increment Equivalent Funds pursuant to the Township Compensation Agreement; to appropriate and authorize the expenditure of both the remainder of those same service payments in lieu of taxes in those same funds after making payment to Norwich Township and the community development charges the City receives for deposit into the new NCA fund pursuant to the TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement; and to declare an emergency.

WHEREAS, Pulte Homes of Ohio, LLC and Harmony Development Group, LLC (together, the "Developers") plan to develop an approximately ±369.2 acre site within the City of Columbus near the intersection of Alton & Darby Creek Road and Renner Road (the "Developers' Property") to construct 525 single family homes and 220 multi-family apartment units to the north of Renner Road ("Sugar Farm") and to construct 147 single family homes and 196 other residential units south of Renner Road ("Renner South") along with appropriate associated amenities and parking necessary to support those; and

WHEREAS, Sugar Farm and Renner South will require, among other things, a new pump station, water line extension, stormwater BMP's, multi-use trails, stream restoration, and improvements to existing streets and intersections including Hilliard-Rome Road, Alton & Darby Creek Road, Feder Road, Roberts Road, and Renner Road (collectively, the "Public Infrastructure Improvements"); and

WHEREAS, the Director of the Department of Development and the Developers entered into a development agreement dated March 10, 2021 (the "Big Darby - Sugar Farm and Renner South Plan Agreement") authorized by Ordinance 1557-2020 to outline the plans and respective commitments of the City and the Developers for the fulfillment of the "Big Darby Revenue Program" requirements as established by Resolution 0216X-2008, including establishing a new community authority ("NCA") and tax increment financing ("TIF") for the Developers' Property; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 0118X-2021 and Resolution 0243X-2021 established the Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA ("SFRS NCA") pursuant to Chapter 349 of the Ohio Revised Code ("ORC") as a body politic and corporate within the boundaries of the Developers' Property to impose 6.5 mills on the Developers' Property for thirty years; and

WHEREAS, the City and the SFRS NCA will enter into an "Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement" whereby the SFRS NCA will annually retain a portion of the charges generated from the 6.5 mills for an allowance towards its administrative costs and the balance of those charges (the "Available Charge Revenue") will be remitted to and accepted for deposit by the City into a new NCA fund to pay for the Public Infrastructure Improvements; and

WHEREAS, City Council passed Ordinance 3248-2021 to create a new separate TIF area pursuant to ORC Section 5709.40(B) for parcel number 203-304335 within Sugar Farm (the "Sugar Farm 40(B) TIF"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance 3319-2021, the City entered into the "County Compensation Agreement" required by ORC Section 5709.40(E) with Franklin County, which then allowed City Council to pass Ordinance 3259-2021 to establish two new TIF incentive districts pursuant to ORC Section 5709.40(C) for the remaining area in Sugar Farm (the "Sugar Farm Incentive District") and the entire area of Renner South (the "Renner South Incentive District"); and

WHEREAS, in adherence to the TIF statues under the ORC, the schools districts and taxing authorities named in ORC Section 5709.40(F) will first receive the applicable service payments in lieu of taxes (the "Service Payments") from these TIFs directly from the county with the balance being remitted to the City for deposit into the appropriate TIF funds; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Big Darby Revenue Program and the County Compensation Agreement, the City will enter into the "Township Compensation Agreement" with Norwich Township (the "Township") to provide it a portion of the appropriated and authorized Service Payments equivalent to the amount of property taxes it would have receive from its levies that are not otherwise directly available to the Township from the county under ORC Section 5709.40; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Big Darby - Sugar Farm and Renner South Plan Agreement, the Developers have agreed to provide front-end financing for the design and construction of the Public Infrastructure Improvements provided that the City reimburses the eligible costs and associated accrued interest of those Public Infrastructure Improvements over time from the City's portion of its remaining Service Payments after first making payment to the Township (the "Available TIF Revenue"); and

WHEREAS, the City is willing to appropriate and authorize the expenditure of the Available Charge Revenue deposited in the new NCA fund and the Available TIF Revenue to be deposited in the Sugar Farm 40(B) TIF, Sugar Farm Incentive District, and Renner South Incentive District TIF Funds to reimburse the Developers' eligible costs and associated accrued interest of the Public Infrastructure Improvements provided that the Developers approve and enter into the "TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement" with the City; and

WHEREAS, it is contemplated that Pulte Homes of Ohio, LLC will receive the Available Charge Revenue and the Available TIF Revenue from the Sugar Farm properties, and Harmony Development Group, LLC will receive the Available Charge Revenue and the Available TIF Revenue from the Renner South properties for reimbursement of each of the Developers' respective costs and associated accrued interest on those costs of the Public Infrastructure Improvements; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement, the City and the Developers may enter into further subsequent agreements as necessary to further define the terms and conditions pursuant to which

the Public Infrastructure Improvements will be designed, constructed, and maintained, including but not limited to, Guaranteed Maximum Reimbursement Agreements, Contribution Agreements, Maintenance Agreements, Easement Agreements, and Restrictive Covenants (each as referenced herein and those agreements hereinafter individually and collectively referred to as the "Subsequent Agreements"); and

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the usual daily operations of the Department of Development in that it is immediately necessary to appropriate and authorize the expenditure of a portion of the Service Payments to the Township and the Available Charge Revenue and Available TIF Revenue to the Developers, and to enter into the foregoing Intergovernmental Agreement, Township Compensation Agreement, TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement, and Subsequent Agreements to expedite the development and financing of the Public Infrastructure Improvements in progress all for the preservation of the public health, peace, property, and safety, that preservation; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

- Section 1. Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement. That the Director of the Department of Development (the "Director"), or his or her designee, for and in the name of the City, is hereby authorized to execute and deliver the "Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement" presently on file with the Director along with any changes or amendments thereto not inconsistent with this Ordinance and not substantially adverse to the City and which shall be approved by the Director and the City Attorney, provided that the approval of such changes and amendments thereto, and the character of those changes and amendments as not being substantially adverse to the City, shall be evidenced conclusively by the Director's execution and delivery thereof.
- Section 2. Township Compensation Agreement. That the Director, or his or her designee, for and in the name of the City, is hereby authorized to execute and deliver the "Township Compensation Agreement" presently on file with the Director along with any changes or amendments thereto not inconsistent with this Ordinance and not substantially adverse to the City and which shall be approved by the Director and the City Attorney, provided that the approval of such changes and amendments thereto, and the character of those changes and amendments as not being substantially adverse to the City, shall be evidenced conclusively by the Director's execution and delivery thereof.
- Section 3. TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement. That the Director, or his or her designee, for and in the name of the City, is hereby authorized to execute and deliver the "TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement" presently on file with the Director along with any changes or amendments thereto not inconsistent with this Ordinance and not substantially adverse to the City and which shall be approved by the Director and the City Attorney, provided that the approval of such changes and amendments thereto, and the character of those changes and amendments as not being substantially adverse to the City, shall be evidenced conclusively by the Director's execution and delivery thereof.
- Section 4. Subsequent Agreements. That the Director or other appropriate officers of the City are authorized to execute Subsequent Agreements, defined within the recitals herein, as well as any ensuing amendments to those Subsequent Agreements, subject to approval by the City Attorney's Office, and to take all actions as may be necessary to implement this Ordinance and the transactions contemplated by the Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement, Township

Compensation Agreement, the TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement, and/or any Subsequent Agreement as may be required to implement same.

- Section 5. SFRS NCA Fund. That this Council hereby establishes, in line with the Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement, a city fund related to the Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA (the "SFRS NCA Fund") into which there shall be deposited the community development charges collected by the City from the Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA, defined herein, after the Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA retains an allowance pursuant to the Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement for its administrative costs (the "Available Charge Revenue"). The City Auditor is hereby authorized to deposit the monies contributed by Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA to the City into the SFRS NCA Fund. The City Auditor may establish the SFRS NCA Fund as a new City fund including with any necessary subfunds or project accounts. The SFRS Fund shall remain in existence so long as the Available Charge Revenue is collected from the Sugar Farm-Renner South NCA and used for the purposes of the "Big Darby Revenue Program," as may be amended from time to time and as defined herein and also by Resolution 0216X-2008.
- Section 6. Appropriation and Expenditure to Township. That the service payments in lieu of taxes and property tax rollback payments deposited into the Sugar Farm 40(B) TIF Municipal Public Improvement Tax Increment Equivalent Fund created by Ordinance 3248-2021 and the Sugar Farm Incentive District, Renner South Incentive District Municipal Public Improvement Tax Increment Equivalent Funds created by Ordinance 3259-2021 (all three funds, collectively, the "TIF Funds") equal to the amount of property taxes the Norwich Township (the "Township") Fire Department and Emergency Medicals Services would have received if not for the TIF exemption granted by Ordinance 3248-2021 and Ordinance 3259-2021 and not otherwise distributed directly to the Township by Franklin County shall be deemed appropriated for the purposes set forth in the Township Compensation Agreement and authorized to be expended therefrom in accordance with the Township Compensation Agreement, and the City Auditor is authorized to make payments to the Township or its designee from the TIF Funds in accordance with the Township Compensation Agreement upon order of the Director, or his or her designee, and that no order shall be drawn or money paid except by voucher, the form of which shall be approved by the City Auditor.
- Section 7. Appropriation and Expenditure to Developers. That the Available Charge Revenue deposited into the SFRS NCA Fund and the remaining service payments in lieu of taxes and property tax rollback payments deposited into the TIF Funds, after making payment to the Township (the "Available TIF Revenue"), shall be deemed appropriated for the purposes set forth in the TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement and/or the Subsequent Agreements and authorized to be expended therefrom in accordance with the TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement and/or the Subsequent Agreements, and the City Auditor is authorized to make payments to Pulte Homes of Ohio, LLC and Harmony Development Group, LLC or their designees from the Available Charge Revenue in the SFRS NCA Fund and the Available TIF Revenue in the TIF Funds in accordance with the TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement and/or the Subsequent Agreements upon order of the Director, or his or her designee, and that no order shall be drawn or money paid except by voucher, the form of which shall be approved by the City Auditor.
- Section 8. ED Fees. That the City Auditor is authorized to make annual transfers of \$5,000 from each of the TIF Funds, or up to \$15,000 total annually from any combination of the TIF Funds, to the

Business Tax Incentive Fund (2229), subject to the authorization of the Director, or his or her designee, for the City TIF Administrative Fee, as defined in and in accordance with the TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement and Ordinance 3221-2018.

- Section 9. Account Codes. That the City Auditor is authorized to establish such accounting codes as necessary, to make any accounting changes to revise the funding source for all agreements, contracts, amendments, or modifications associated with this Ordinance and the transactions contemplated by the Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement, the Township Compensation Agreement, the TIF & NCA Reimbursement Agreement, the Subsequent Agreements and/or their amendments.
- Section 10. Transfers. That the City Auditor is hereby authorized to transfer the unencumbered balance in a project account or subfund to the unallocated balance account within the same fund upon receipt of certification by the Director of the Department administering said project that the project has been completed and the monies are no longer required for said project.

Section 11. <u>Emergency</u>. That for reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor or ten days after passage if the Mayor neither approves nor vetoes the same.

This ordinance authorizes the City Clerk to enter into a grant agreement with the Columbus Chamber of Commerce in support of the organization's creation of the Engaging New and Emerging Citizens and Community Guidebook.

The Columbus Chamber of Commerce's mission is to help the Columbus Region grow and thrive. With one of the most extensive networks in Central Ohio, the Columbus Chamber is uniquely equipped to create the Engaging New and Emerging Citizens and Community Guidebook that will support the immigrant, migrant, and refugee community in the city of Columbus. This guidebook will continue education groundwork laid in 2021. It will share better practices being utilized by Chamber members who have create new policies and procedures to be employers of choice for immigrant and refugee job seekers. The Columbus Chamber values the vibrancy and skill sets that our refugee and immigrant populations bring to the city of Columbus.

Columbus is currently the 14th largest metro area in the United States with over 992,000 residents. Over 155,000 of those residents are members of the immigrant and refugee communities. While European immigration to Columbus has declined, the metropolitan area has seen great increases in African, Latin American and Asian immigration, particularly from China, Mexico, India, and Somalia. The city's Hispanic community is mostly Mexican with a sizable Puerto Rican population. Foreign-born individuals account for about 82% of new residents. 40% came from Asia, 23% from Africa, 22% from Latin America and 13% immigrated from Europe. The economic divide between these communities and native-born residents is tremendous, with immigrant households often earning 25% less than native-born households.

The Columbus Chamber values the vibrancy and skill sets that our refugee and immigrant populations bring to the city of Columbus. To address these socioeconomic issues from a workforce perspective, the Columbus Chamber is partnering with Community Refugee and Immigration Services (CRIS) and Jewish Family Services to create the Engaging New and Emerging Citizens and Community Guidebook. Because there are multiple barriers that commonly keep employers from hiring immigrants and refugees, greater education is needed to bridge the gap of understanding.

The Chamber, CRIS, and Jewish Family Services are already offering regular education to members on a quarterly basis. They are also offering support directly to job-seekers in the immigrant and refugee community. The Engaging New and Emerging Citizens and Community Guidebook will serve as supportive marketing collateral to explain both solutions and offer guidance and technical assistance. This work will allow the Chamber Foundation to also assist small and mid-size businesses within the Chamber of Commerce membership that do not have an internal HR department and rely on the Chamber for workforce development assistance. The City of Columbus funds will provide much needed financial support for the Chamber Foundation to meet the goal of connecting our businesses/employers to one of our designated underutilized talent pipelines: Refugees and Immigrants in the Columbus region.

Emergency action is necessary to allow the Chamber to begin developing this supportive guidebook as soon as possible.

Fiscal Impact: Funding is available within the Job Growth subfund.

Background: This legislation authorizes the Director of Development to enter into a non-profit services contract in an amount up to \$263,574.98 with Smart Columbus LLC. Smart Columbus LLC is the non-profit organization created to continue the efforts of the Smart Columbus US Department of Transportation Grant.

The mission of Smart Columbus LLC is to create an agile and collaborative innovation lab that delivers impact through thought leadership, partnership and project delivery.

- Thought leadership is developing and advocating for a point of view on the future of cities, convening like-minded cities, our community and partners to accelerate learning and imagine a different future together, and inspire future change by telling the story of the ecosystem's work and impact and uplifting stories of impact across the region.
- Fostering an ecosystem of partnerships motivated by, invested in, and taking action toward, a shared vision

through one or more of the following levels:

- o Counsel: Smart Columbus provides advice and guidance to those in the public-private-academic communities.
- Ocnnect partners: Smart Columbus introduces and connects businesses and individuals in our ecosystem to one another to foster collaborations.
 - o Develop strategy: Smart Columbus develops a strategy for identified projects or areas of impact.
- o Build and deploy solutions: Smart Columbus builds and deploys solutions for identified projects or areas of impact.
- Deliver impact through human-centered, technology-enabled solutions co-created with the community
 - o Projects include: Intersectional, New and next, Impactful, Doable, and Real
- Under one of the following business models: Smart Columbus supports a portfolio of projects that are initiated and financially supported in different business models- these are the ways:
- Incubation Model: The organization will proactively invest in an idea or domain area, taking it through incubation, market analysis, and product development with invested resources. This direct influence on creating a solution requires high investment but allows for building and influencing of solutions to impact a defined area of work. Background: This legislation authorizes the Director of Finance and Management, on behalf of Columbus Public Health, to execute a Lease Agreement with Columbus Neighborhood Health Center, Inc. (CNHC), dba PrimaryOne Health, as Tenant, for use of city-owned medical office space located at 1180 East Main Street, commonly known as the East Central Health Center. Columbus Neighborhood Health Center, Inc. has been Columbus Public Health's service provider of primary health care services to medically under served residents at the East Central Health Center for the past 15 years. The current Lease has no remaining renewal options and expired on February 28, 2022 thus necessitating the need for a new lease agreement. The proposed Lease Agreement will be for and initial term of five (5) consecutive one (1) year periods and will include two (2) automatic renewal options each for a period of five (5) consecutive one (1) year terms. Each one-year lease period is subject to the renewal of CNHC's annual contract with the Columbus Health Department as its provider of primary health care services to medically under served residents. This legislation is presented as emergency measure in order for operation of the East Central Health Center to continue uninterrupted.

Fiscal Impact: No funding is required for this legislation. The City will receive annual rent income of \$257,370.00 in the first year of the Lease that will be deposited in Fund 7784, the Neighborhood Health Capital Reserve Fund, which was established for the support of the City's neighborhood health center facilities to assist in covering the expenses related to the repair and replacements of building interior and exterior components and for the replacement cost of associated equipment and furnishings that have reached the end of their useful life.

WHEREAS, the current Lease Agreement with Columbus Neighborhood Health Center, Inc. has no renewal options remaining and expired February 28, 2022 thus necessitating the need for a new lease agreement; and

The Site is designated in Chapter 3325, University District Zoning Overlay as being in the "Regional Commercial Subarea". The *University District Plan* (2015) designates the site as "Regional Mixed Use" appropriate for the highest level of intensity in the planning area with retail, office and multi-family residential land uses and structured parking, as proposed with this rezoning.

- **1. PERMITTED USES:** Permitted uses shall be all uses of Section 3356.03, C-4 Permitted Uses.
- **2.DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS:** Unless otherwise indicated on the Site Plan or in this written text, the applicable development standards shall be those standards contained in Chapter 3356, C-4, Commercial District, Chapter 3325, University District Zoning Overlay, as applicable to the RC, Regional Commercial District, and Chapter 3312, Off-Street Parking and Loading, of the Columbus City Code.

A. Density, Height, Lot and/or Setback Commitments.

Height District shall be H-110, subject to the maximum building height being 85 feet, with height as defined in Columbus City Code Section 3303.08, Letter H.

B. Access, Loading, Parking and/or Traffic Related Commitments.

- 1. Site access shall be as depicted on the Site Plan.
- 2. A loading area, not a loading space, shall be provided on the east side of the building, as depicted on the Site Plan.
- 3. Compact parking spaces are provided as itemized in Section H and on the Site Plan.

C. Buffering, Landscaping, Open Space, and/or Screening Commitments.

A landscaping plan shall be included in the final Site Compliance Plan. Street trees shall be provided on the W. Lane Avenue and W. Norwich Avenue frontages.

D. Building design and/or Interior-Exterior treatment commitments.

The exterior building materials will consist of masonry, including brick, fiber cement and other panelized wall systems, with accent materials, and large areas of window glazing on the first floor of the W. Lane Avenue

frontage.

E. Dumpsters, Lighting, Outdoor Display Areas and/or Environmental Commitments.

N/A.

F. Graphics and Signage Commitments.

All graphics shall conform to Article 15 of the Columbus Graphics Code, as it applies to the C-4, Commercial District and Chapter 3325, University District Zoning Overlay, as applicable to the Regional Commercial Subarea. Any variance to applicable sign standards shall be submitted to the Columbus Graphics Commission.

G. Other CPD Requirements.

- 1. Natural Environment: The Site is located on the north side of W. Lane Avenue, 90 +/- feet west of the intersection of W. Lane Avenue and Neil Avenue, and the south side of W. Norwich Avenue.
- 2. Existing Land Use: All existing buildings and parking lots will be removed for redevelopment of the site.
- 3. Circulation: Vehicular access and on-site vehicular circulation shall be as depicted on the Site Plan.
- 4. Visual Form of the Environment: The proposed uses are appropriate for the location, as designated by the *University District Plan* (2015).
- 5. Visibility: The site is visible from W. Lane Avenue and W. Norwich Avenue.
- 6. Proposed Development: Commercial and residential development and structured parking as permitted by this text and as depicted on the Site Plan.
- 7. Behavior Patterns: Vehicular access and circulation shall be as depicted on the Site Plan.
- 8. Emissions: Development will conform to City of Columbus requirements as further controlled by development standards of this development text. There will be no objectionable emissions.

H. Modification of Code Standards.

- 1. Section 3312.29, Parking Space, to provide 25 of the 499 493 parking spaces in the parking structure as compact parking spaces by reducing parking space dimensions for 90 degree parking spaces from 9'x18' to 7 spaces at 9' x 17' and 18 spaces at 8' x 18'.
- 2. Section 3312.53, Minimum Number of Loading Spaces Required, to reduce required loading spaces, as defined, from 1 to 0.
- 3. Section 3321.05, Vision Clearance, to reduce the 10'x10' clear vision triangle at the intersection of the alley intersecting W. Norwich Avenue on the east side of the building and the west side of the building to 4'x4' and 5.5'x5.5'.
- 4. Section 3325.323, Building Height Standards, to increase permitted height from 72 feet to 85 feet, with height

as defined in Columbus City Code Section 3303.08, Letter H.

5. Section 3361.02, Permitted Uses, to permit ground level residential uses, which are Residential or Apartment Residential district uses, while such uses are proposed.

I. Miscellaneous Commitments.

- 1. The developer shall comply with applicable monetary payment requirements of Chapter 3318, Parkland Dedication, Columbus City Code.
- 2. Photo documentation of the exterior of the Harrison House building and representative photo documentation of the interior of the Harrison House building shall be provided to the Department of Development, Planning Division, prior to demolition of the Harrison House building.
- 23. Development of the site shall be in accordance with the Site Plan titled "222 W. Lane Avenue", dated 2/22/2022 and signed by David B. Perry, Agent for Applicant, and Donald Plank, Attorney for Applicant, The Site Plan may be slightly adjusted to reflect engineering, topographical, or other site data developed at the time final development and engineering plans are completed. Any slight adjustment to the Plan shall be reviewed and may be approved by the Director of the Building and Zoning Services Department or his designee upon submission of the appropriate data regarding the proposed adjustment.

SECTION 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

BACKGROUND: This ordinance authorizes the Director of Development to petition the Director of the Ohio Department of Development for an amendment to the certification of a designated area within the City of Columbus (City) as an urban jobs and enterprise zone under state law. This designated area, known as the City of Columbus Enterprise Zone, Zone Number 023 (Zone), was authorized by City Council (Council) Ordinance Number 779-85 and certified by the Ohio Department of Development in June 1985 and amended by Council by Ordinance Numbers 2722-85 in 1986; 2080-89 in 1989; 1949-92, 2249-92 and 2690-92 in 1992; 1079-94 and 1228-94 in 1994; 1274-95, 2196-95 and 2817-95 in 1995; 0533-99 in 1999; 1785-00 in 2000; 1464-02 in 2002; 0225-03 in 2003; 0032-2012 in 2012, 1442-2020 in 2020 and 0279-2021 in 2021. This Zone was most recently certified by the Ohio Development Services Agency on May 20, 2021. This ordinance will amend the Zone by adding approximately 119 acres as described in Attachments A-1 through A-3 (Amended Table of Census Areas (A-1), City of Columbus Enterprise Zone Expansion Map (A-2) and List of Parcels to be added to the City of Columbus Enterprise Zone (A-3)). This addition is that of land comprised of 15 individual parcels within the City of Columbus, contiguous with the current boundary of the City of Columbus Enterprise Zone but not currently within the boundary of the City of Columbus Enterprise Zone. The City will benefit from this addition to the Zone through the ability to use enterprise zone tax incentives in this area to elicit business growth, attract investment in industrial/commercial facilities, and encourage job creation and retention.

Approximately one-third (33.33%) of the parcels to be added to the City of Columbus Enterprise Zone are within the Columbus City School District (CCSD), one-third (33.33%) are within the Gahanna-Jefferson City School District (GJCSD), and one-third (33.33%) are within the South-Western City School District (SWCSD). In terms of area, eleven percent (11%) of the area to be added is within the CCSD, eleven percent (11%) of the area to be added is within the GJCSD, and seventy-eight percent (78%) of the area to be added is within the SWCSD. The CCSD, GJCSD, and SWCSD have been advised of this proposal as required under State law.

Emergency legislation is necessary to maintain project schedules and to coincide with established development timelines.

FISCAL IMPACT: No funding is required for this legislation.

To authorize the Director of the Department of Development to petition the Director of the Ohio Department of Development for an amendment to the certification of the existing urban jobs and enterprise zone within the City of Columbus known as the Columbus Enterprise Zone, and to declare an emergency.

WHEREAS, the Ohio Urban Jobs and Enterprise Zone Act (the "Act"), Ohio Revised Code ("ORC") Sections 5709.61 through 5709.69, authorizes the City of Columbus (the "City") to designate areas as urban jobs and enterprise zones and to execute agreements with certain enterprises for the purposes of (1) creating and preserving employment opportunities within the zone, (2) improving the economic climate of the City, (3) establishing, expanding, renovating or occupying a facility and (4) hiring new employees or preserving employment opportunities for existing employees, in return for one or more specified local tax incentives granted by the City; and

WHEREAS, the Columbus City Council has determined and found, as included in the City Council Ordinance Number 0779-85, which has been modified by Ordinances 2722-85, 2080-89, 1949-92, 2249-92, 2690-02, 1079-94, 1228-94, 1274-95, 2196-95, 2817-95, 0533-99, 1785-00, 1464-02, 0225-03, 0032-2012, 1442-2020 and 0279-2021 that the designation of a zone will create and preserve employment opportunities in the zone and improve the economic climate of the City and has designated a zone (the "Zone"); and

WHEREAS, the Zone was most recently certified by the Ohio Development Services Agency on May 20, 2021; and

WHEREAS the City is required by law to administer the Zone and agreements with the City in accordance with the Act, including but not limited to: (1) to continue to operate the Tax Incentive Review Council (TIRC) as specified in ORC Section 5709.85, (2) to ensure that the Zone abatement agreements contain the information required in ORC Section 5709.631, including but not limited to a description of the project, the amount to be invested, the number of jobs created and/or retained, the annual payroll associated with these jobs and specific percentages and numbers of years of tax abatement being granted for real property tax incentives, (3) to forward copies of all Zone abatement agreements to both the Ohio Department of Development and the Ohio Department of Taxation within fifteen (15) days after the agreement is entered into as specified in the ORC, (4) to notify affected Board(s) of Education of proposed projects a minimum of fourteen (14) days prior to formal legislative consideration and to included comments by the Board(s) of Education as part of the review process as required under ORC Section 5709.83, (5) to maintain a centralized record of all aspects of the zone, including copies of the agreements, a list of the members of the TIRC, and a summary of the TIRC's review of each agreement, (6) to submit a comprehensive annual report of the status of all Zone activities on or before March 31 of each year pursuant to ORC 5709.68; and

WHEREAS, this amendment will change the Zone by adding to the Zone and, after the addition, the Zone will have a population of at least four thousand (4,000) people according to the best and most recent data available and shall have at least two of the characteristics described in ORC Subsections 5709.61 (A) (1), (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), (f), (g), or (h); and

WHEREAS, the inclusion of this additional area will create and preserve employment opportunities in the Zone, will improve the economic climate of the City, will encourage the development of certain enterprises for the purpose of establishing, expanding, renovating or occupying facilities, will require the hiring of new employees and will preserve employment opportunities for existing

employees and thus is still eligible as a Zone under the Act; and

WHEREAS, the City will have the responsibility of negotiating and administering all Zone abatement agreements pursuant to ORC Section 5709.631; and

whereas, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the Department of Development in that it is immediately necessary to designate the amended Columbus Enterprise Zone in order to maintain project schedules and to coincide with established development timelines thereby preserving the public health, peace, property, safety and welfare; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS

- Section 1. That the City Council hereby finds and determines that: (a) the Columbus Enterprise Zone (Zone) qualifies as a Zone under the requirements of the Act as described in the Whereas clauses and (b) the areas described and shown as the proposed amended Zone in Attachment A attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference is located within the corporate limits of the City of Columbus.
- Section 2. That the City Council hereby finds and determines that (a) the City meets all of the requirements of the Act to allow it to designate a Zone; and (b) the proposed amended Zone meets all the requirements of the Act for designation of a Zone including, but not limited to, the following objectives: (i) create and preserve employment opportunities in the Zone, (ii) improve the economic climate of the City, (iii) establish, expand, renovate or occupy existing and new facilities, and (iv) result in the hiring of new employees and the preservation of employment opportunities for existing employees.
- Section 3. That the City Council hereby designates the Zone as amended and identified in Attachments A-1 through A-3 as an amended Zone of the City pursuant to and in accordance with the requirements of the Act; and that this amended Zone identified in Attachments A-1 through A-3 supersedes the boundary description of the Zone contained in City Council Ordinance No. 779 -85, and modified by City Council Ordinance Nos. 2722-85, 2080-89, 1949-92, 2249-92, 2690-02, 1079-94, 1228-94, 1274-95, 2196-95, 2817-95, 0533-99, 1785-00, 1464-02, 0225-03, 0032-2012, 1442-2020 and 0279-2021.
- **Section 4.** That the Director of the Department of Development of the City is hereby authorized and directed, on behalf of the City, to petition the Director of the Ohio Department of Development, in accordance with the Act, for certification of the areas constituting the amended Zone as having the characteristics set forth in Section 5709.61 of the ORC.
- **Section 5.** That for reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, the ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor or ten days after the passage if the Mayor neither approves nor vetoes the same.

BACKGROUND: The City established the Stelzer-Stygler Community Reinvestment Area (CRA) in 1986 to stimulate private investment and job creation. In 1994, changes in the CRA law placed additional obligations on municipalities to compensate school districts for lost revenues arising from tax abatements. In May 2002, the City entered into a Compensation Agreement with the Gahanna-Jefferson School District to compensate the District for revenues from real property taxes forgone due to abatements on parcels in the Stelzer-Stygler CRA.

The present legislation authorizes the payment of \$93,835.91 to the Gahanna-Jefferson City School District as the compensation due in 2022 for tax year 2021 This sum is calculated using the definitions in the Compensation Agreement and is based on one parcel (520-250987) in the Gahanna-Jefferson School District area of the Stelzer-Stygler CRA with building improvements and CRA tax abatements. The abatement for parcel 520-250987 commenced with tax year 2017 and will terminate in tax year 2026.

The total private investment subject to exemption in the new buildings constructed on this parcel was approximately \$7,956,000 in 2021.

Emergency action is requested in order for the City to make the \$93,835.91 payment to the Gahanna-Jefferson City School District according to the schedule established in the Compensation Agreement.

FISCAL IMPACT: The 2022 General Fund budget (citywide account) includes funding for this payment to

the Gahanna-Jefferson School District. A transfer equal to 25 percent (25%) of the payment will be transferred from the Special Income Tax Fund.

To authorize the City Auditor to transfer \$93,835.91 within the General Fund; to authorize the City Auditor to appropriate and transfer \$23,458.98 in cash from the Special Income Tax Fund to the General Fund; to authorize the payment of \$93,835.91 to the Gahanna-Jefferson School District to compensate for real property tax revenues forgone as a result of CRA tax abatements in the Stelzer-Stygler CRA; to authorize the expenditure of \$93,835.91 from the General Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$93,835.91)

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 1698-78, approved August 3, 1978, authorized the Development Department to carry out a Community Reinvestment Program (CRA) pursuant to Sections 3735.65 to 3735.70 of the Ohio Revised Code, to stimulate job creation and growth in the area; and

SOUTH LINDEN AREA COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION: Approval.

CITY DEPARTMENTS' RECOMMENDATION: Approval. The site consists of one undeveloped parcel in the R-3, Residential District which was formerly developed with a two-unit dwelling. The requested Council variance will permit a new two-unit dwelling to be constructed on the site. A Council variance is required because the R-3 district permits only single-unit dwellings. Variances to reduce the lot width and lot area are also included with this request. The site is within the boundaries of the *South Linden Land Use Plan* (2018), which recommends "Medium Density Residential" land uses at this location. Additionally, the Plan includes adoption of the *Columbus Citywide Planning Policies* (C2P2) Design Guidelines (2018). The guidelines recommend that new housing be oriented to the street, reflect the design of nearby structures, position parking in the rear, and provide open space and street trees. Staff finds that the proposal is consistent with the Plan's land use recommendations, C2P2 Design Guidelines, and development pattern in this neighborhood. The applicant has agreed to provide an additional on-site shade tree. As the proposed two-unit dwelling is within a neighborhood that includes a mixture of housing types, the request does not introduce an incompatible use to the area.

To grant a Variance from the provisions of Sections 3332.035, R-3 residential district; 3332.05(A)(4), Area

district lot width requirements; and 3332.13, R-3 area district requirements, of the Columbus City Codes; for the property located at **1283-1285 E. 24TH AVE. (43211)**, to permit a two-unit dwelling with reduced development standards in the R-3, Residential District (Council Variance #CV21-137).

WHEREAS, by application #CV21-137, the owner of property at 1283-1285 E. 24TH AVE. (43211), is requesting a Council variance to permit a two-unit dwelling with reduced development standards in the R-3, Residential District; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.035, R-3 residential district, lists single-unit dwellings as the only permitted residential use, while the applicant proposes a two-unit dwelling; and

WHEREAS, Section 3332.05(A)(4), Area district lot width requirements, requires a minimum lot width of 50 feet in the R-3, Residential District, while the applicant proposes to maintain a lot width of 40± feet; and

The purpose of this ordinance is to authorize the Director of Finance and Management to modify the contract with The McLean Company to add a raw materials and labor surcharge of \$13,840.00 for the purchase of five tow-behind split drum vibratory rollers for the Department of Public Service, Division of Infrastructure Management.

The Department of Public Service, Division of Infrastructure Management, is responsible for maintaining Columbus roadways. This includes filling potholes, street sweeping, mowing, alley resurfacing, and snow and ice removal. Ordinance 2492-2020 authorized the purchase of two asphalt smooth drum rollers and five tow-behind split drum vibratory rollers for the purpose of maintaining the roads.

After the ordinance authorized the purchase and the two asphalt smooth drum rollers were delivered, The McLean Company notified the Director of Finance and Management that due to supply chain and labor issues beyond their control, a surcharge of \$2,768.00 per roller was necessary to build the remaining five tow-behind split drum vibratory rollers.

This ordinance authorizes the Director of Finance and Management to modify the existing contract to add the surcharge of \$2,768.00 per tow-behind split drum vibratory roller, for total surcharges of \$13,840.00. The Department feels these changes are acceptable and the five tow-behind split drum vibratory rollers offered by The McLean Company will meet the needs of the Department.

2. CONTRACT COMPLIANCE

The contract compliance number for The McLean Company is CC006445 and expires on 4/20/2022.

3. FISCAL IMPACT

Funds are budgeted and available for this expenditure from the Municipal Motor Vehicle Tax Fund (Fund 2266).

4. EMERGENCY DESIGNATION

The department requests emergency designation so this equipment can be put into service as quickly as possible to prevent interruption to, or disruption of, the Division of Infrastructure Management operations.

The purpose of the Lead Safe Columbus Grant Program is to generate lead safe affordable housing and to prevent lead poising of children and adults within Columbus neighborhoods. The purpose of this contract is to increase the capacity of the City of Columbus to produce high quality, lead based paint inspections, risk assessments, work specifications, and final clearance testing as outlined in the HUD 2012 Guidelines and to generate lead-safe units in a timely and efficient manner for the citizens of Columbus.

The Department of Development advertised RFQ014279 on Vendor Services in November 2019 for Licensed Lead Risk Inspector/Assessor services for the Lead Safe Columbus program. Two bids were received and the Director of Development entered into contract with both bidders under the authority of Columbus City Code Section 329.19. For the original contract, the contract period is from the date of approval of the purchase order to December 31, 2020, with an option to renew until the grant period has been completed. WHEREAS, feedback from the community has contributed to these amendments to section 2329.11 of Chapter 2329 to clarify provisions related to community noise by clarifying the variance procedures of the Columbus Board of Health; and

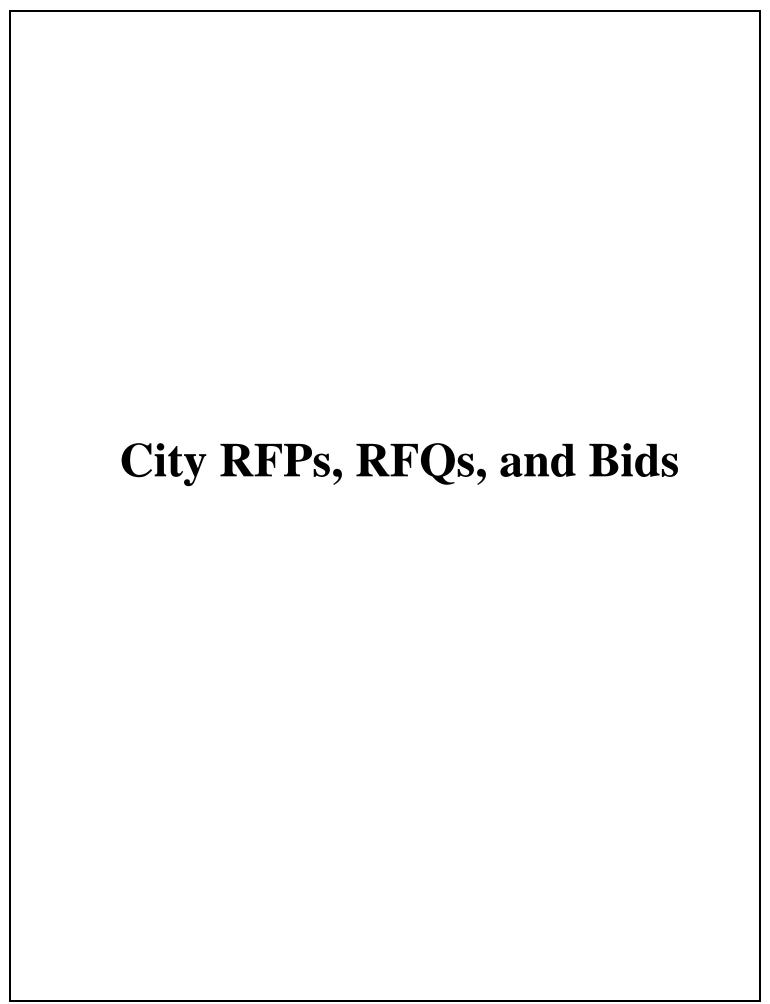
WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the daily operation of the Columbus Health Department and Board of Health such that it is immediately necessary to ensure the Board of Health considers these amendments in its determination for any pending noise variance request that may occur in the 30 days following passage of this legislation; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

SECTION 1. That Section 2329.11 of the Columbus City Codes is hereby amended per the attachment to this ordinance.

SECTION 2. That the existing Section 2329.11 is hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. That, for the reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage or approval by the Mayor or ten days after its passage if the Mayor neither approves nor vetoes the same.
