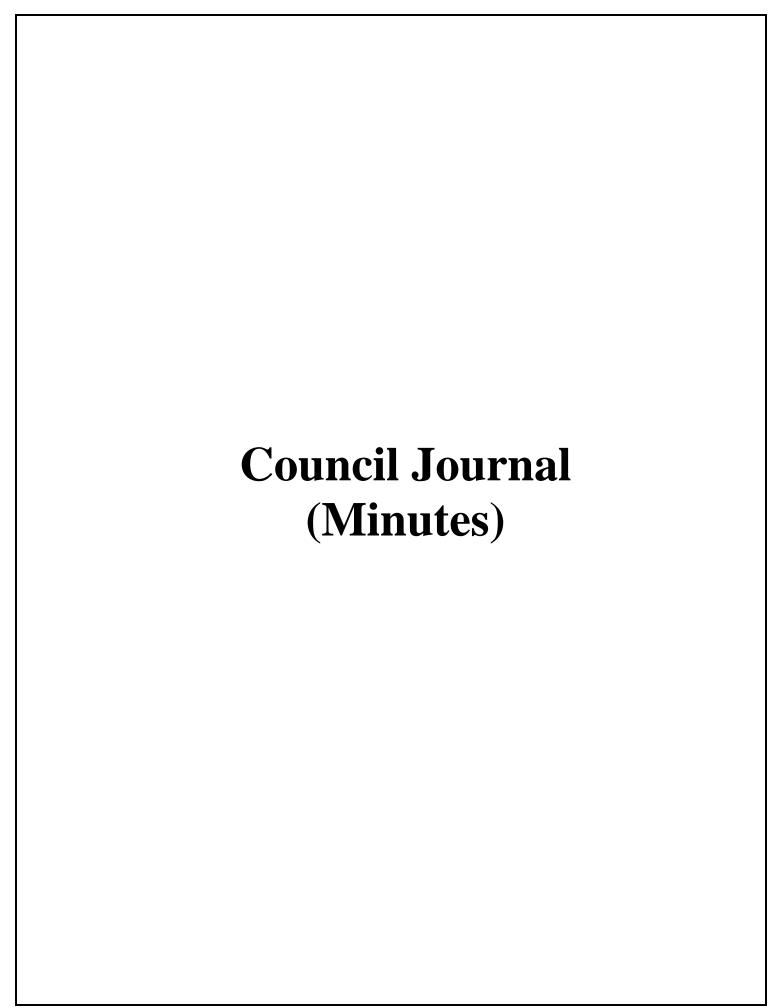

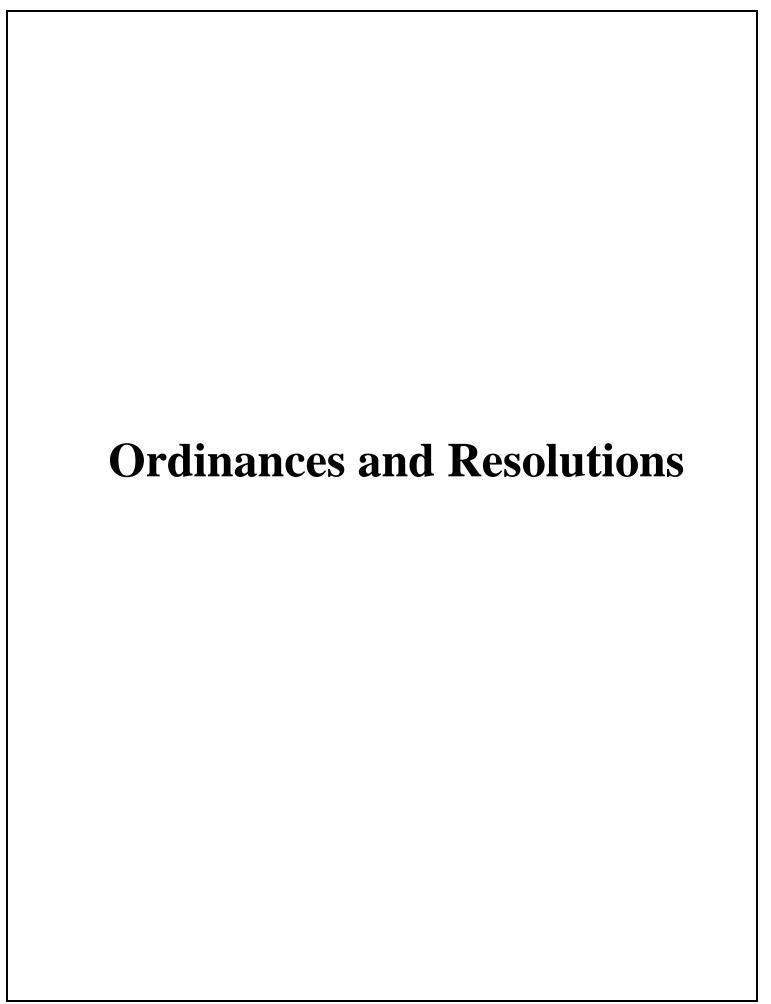

When complete, the 2022 Downtown Strategic Plan will be an update to and will supersede the 2010 Downtown Strategic Plan. The planning process included data collection and analysis, consensus through community participation, and plan preparation. Internal outreach occurred in concert with a series of public workshops to seek input, gather comments and share the draft document, which will chart the course for the future of Downtown's priorities.

Emergency action is requested to support the recommendations of the plan.

Background: Pursuant to the Big Darby Accord Watershed Master Plan and Resolution 0216X-2008 adopted by City Council on April 20, 2009, three revenue generation sources were identified: tax increment financing (TIF), new community authority (NCA) development charges, and per unit developer contributions for Big Darby Accord public improvements and other regionally beneficial public improvements within the Big Darby Accord area (the "Big Darby Revenue Program"). Ordinance 0411-2021 passed by Council on October 11, 2021 (the "Rezoning Ordinance) rezoned the ± 126.3 acres of property at or near the southeast corner of the intersection of West Broad Street and Alton Darby Creek Road and generally located at 6145 West Broad Street (tax parcel ID 010-256886 owned by both GMT Property Holdings LLC and Rock Capital Holdings LLC, and tax parcel ID's 010-306518 and 010-306519 owned by Darby Crossing Apartments LP, the tax parcels collectively being, the "Developer Property," and the companies collectively being, the "Owners"). The Owners

plan to cause the private investment of approximately \$96.2 million to construct 260 multi-family units, 191 single family units, 150,000 square feet of commercial uses, and private improvements pursuant to the Rezoning Ordinance. Consistent with the *Big Darby Accord Watershed Master Plan* and the Rezoning Ordinance, the Developer Property is subject to the requirements of the Big Darby Revenue Program. Pursuant to Ordinance 2659-2021 passed by City Council on October 25, 2021, the Director of the Department of Development entered into the Big Darby - Blauser Farms Development Agreement dated November 22, 2021 to outline the plans and respective commitments for the fulfillment of Big Darby Revenue Program requirements including adding the Developer Property to the "Big Darby West Broad Street NCA" established in accordance with the petition submitted by Crown Pointe LLC, and assigned to Metro Development, LLC, pursuant to Resolutions 0060X-2021, 0242X-2021, and Ordinance 1291-2022. On September 9, 2022, applications for the Written Consent to Add Property to the Big Darby West Broad Street NCA (as amended by the City pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Chapter 349 with the consent of the Owners, the "Applications") were filed by the Owners with the Clerk of City Council. The City of Columbus Department of Public Safety, Division of Fire needs to modify existing contracts with vendors associated with the City's Rapid Response Emergency Addiction Crisis Team (RREACT). RREACT is an innovative outreach service operated by the Division of Fire to actively address the opioid crisis negatively impacting far too many Columbus residents. RREACT outreach includes firefighters/paramedics, Crisis Intervention Team certified peace officers, a substance use case manager, a registered SUD nurse, a family case manager, and a trauma specialist. RREACT proactively connects and builds relationships with opioid users to 1) forge treatment and recovery pathways for users, and 2) provide multi-sector social service navigation and trauma counseling for children and other caregivers in the home. This multi-disciplinary outreach team goes directly into communities to connect with individuals who survive overdose (after Narcan© administration) but then refuse EMS transport to the emergency room. At these follow up meetings, team members assess immediate health needs, provide resource referrals, and create opportunities for users and family/household

members to link with harm reduction supplies, treatment programs, trauma services, and social benefit supports.

All requests were assessed through a Pavement Condition Rating (PCR) form and were given a rating from 0, meaning the worst condition, to 100, meaning the best condition. All requests were prioritized for action based on their respective PCR scores. From there, staff confirmed which projects to move forward with.

Background: This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to modify an existing contract with Tyevco for the Cultural Arts Center Parking Lot and Site Improvements Project. The modification amount being authorized by this ordinance is \$8,000.00.

The Cultural Arts Center (CAC) Parking Lot is mainly used for Columbus Recreation and Parks Department staff and program participants. This facility and lot also hosts guests during special events, including festivals, weddings, and other special engagements. The Cultural Arts Center Parking Lot is constructed of brick pavers, including both historical pavers and new replacement pavers. Over time, areas of the brick paver lot have

warped from the force applied from vehicles making turns, causing bricks to pop out and expose the subgrade of the parking lot. The damaged parking lot poses significant safety issues and trip hazards, increasing the chance for pedestrians to fall and/or twist ankles. Leaving the damaged lot as is will also accelerate further damage and increasing safety hazards. The parking lot was repaired within the last five years but the repair was insufficient in addressing the problem causing the brick pavers to warp out of place. This contract will construct a long term and resilient solution for the brick paver parking lot. The historical brick pavers will be preserved and the warped brick paver lot will be repaired using a more heavy-duty detail. Additionally, a concrete pad and 4 bike racks will be installed as part of these improvements.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Columbus, Columbus Public Health, receives funding for the Implementing Enhanced HIV Prevention and Surveillance for Health Departments to End the HIV Epidemic in Ohio Grant Program from the Ohio Department of Health. The purpose of this grant is to create "Disruptive Innovation" by seeking to prevent new HIV infections by focusing on four (4) pillars: treating HIV to achieve viral suppression, diagnose HIV so that all persons know their HIV status, prevent infections through PrEP and syringe support programs, and respond to HIV clusters or outbreaks within the community. This grant specifically focuses on the diagnoses and prevention pillars and is contingent upon ordinance 2211-2022.

This ordinance authorizes the Board of Health to enter into and, if needed, modify contracts with the following vendors to provide HIV-related early intervention services and any other services allowable under the grant. The term of the contract with each qualified vendor is August 1, 2022, through July 31, 2023, with funding based on vendor estimates of annual funding requirements for allowable services. Using Bonfire, competitive bids were advertised and solicited in accordance with the relevant provisions of Columbus City Code 329 relating to Specifically, Bonfire RFQ021189 and RFQ015537. RFQ021189 was posted on March 8, competitive bidding. 2022 which covers a 58-month grant period (5/1/22-2/28/27) with annual contracts being issued with the grant fiscal year, according to bidding requirements of the City Code. In addition, RFQ015537 was posted in May 2020 which also covered a five-year period (7/1/2020 - 2/28/2025). This RFQ was also for EHE services specifically resource navigation. At that time, Equitas Health bid and was awarded a contract. We are requesting the same services under the ODH EHE grant and received an updated budget and proposal from Equitas and because they completed the bid process on RFQ015537, the bidding was waived for RFQ021189.

Columbus Neighborhood Health Ctr, Inc. dba PrimaryOne Health: \$150,000.00 Equitas Health: \$295,000.00

Under the terms of the grant, funds must be used during the grant period or they are forfeited and CPH may be subject to penalties related to future grant funding. Previously, CPH has reallocated unused funds from vendors through appropriate contract modifications. These modifications oftentimes required additional legislation. Most recently, towards the goals of minimizing unused funds, maximizing available services, and avoiding funding penalties, HRSA has tasked CPH with improving the process by which unused funds are reallocated. If new vendors are identified, future legislation will be submitted.

This ordinance is submitted as an emergency in order to ensure that quality medical care continues to be available to eligible persons living with HIV/AIDS and to ensure timely payment to providers.

Neither vendor is not debarred according to the Excluded Parties listing of the Federal Government and are not listed in the Auditor of States database for Findings for Recovery.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The contracts will be entered into by Columbus Public Health with vendors who meet federal requirements related to services allowable under the Implementing Enhanced HIV Prevention and Surveillance for Health Departments to End the HIV Epidemic in Ohio Grant Program as well as comply with RFQ021189 and City bidding processes. This ordinance will authorize one ACPO in the amount of \$445,000.00 to encumber funds using available grant appropriations for contracts with vendors.

BACKGROUND: In 2021, the Columbus City Attorney's Office launched the Project Taillight public safety and crime prevention pilot program. Through this Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant funded pilot, low-income residents have access to free vehicle safety light repairs. These free repair services keep drivers, passengers and pedestrians safer on the roads and help prevent low-income residents from receiving tickets for safety code violations. This pilot is a partnership between the Columbus City Attorney's Office (CAO) and Columbus Division of Police.

To ensure consistent and ready access to quality repair services for program participants, the Columbus City Attorney's Office worked through Columbus State's Automotive Advisory Board to identify accredited auto shops interested in serving as repair partners for the pilot. Interested parties were vetted to ensure their capacity to meet project terms and requirements as defined by the CAO, the grantor and included in the City of Columbus' standard service contract. Through this process, CAO entered into contract with Lindsay Honda and Mr. Transmission/Milex Complete Auto Care for repair services.

Due to the success of the program, this legislation requests a \$15,000.00 modification to Mr. Transmission/Milex Complete Auto Care's \$23,000 contract (PO299839) and to declare an emergency to ensure services continue uninterrupted through the agreed upon project period.

FISCAL IMPACT: This contract modification is funded through a 2021 Department of Justice's Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance, Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant sub-award from Franklin County Board of Commissioners' Office of Justice Policy and Programs (ordinance 1384-2022). DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION: Approval (5-0) on August 11, 2022.

CITY DEPARTMENTS' RECOMMENDATION: Approval. The site is undeveloped in the CPD, Commercial Planned Development District. The requested L-M, Limited Manufacturing District will permit a self-storage facility as an extension of the existing facility located to the east. The limitation text commits to a site plan, building elevations, and includes development standards addressing setbacks, site access, landscaping, and lighting. A concurrent Council variance (Ordinance #2367-2022; CV22-045) has been submitted to modify the building setback. The site is located within the boundaries of the *Interim Hayden Run Corridor Plan* (2004), which recommends "Neighborhood Center" land uses at this location. Additionally, the Plan includes adoption of the *Columbus Citywide Planning Policies* (C2P2) Design Guidelines (2018). The building elevations include a consistent level of finish across both the Riggins Road and Basinghall Drive frontages, generally consistent with C2P2 Design Guidelines.

To rezone **5050 RIGGINS RD. (43026)**, being 2.51± acres located on the north side of Riggins Road, 430+/-feet west of Amber Lane, **From:** CPD, Commercial Planned Development District, **To:** L-M, Limited Manufacturing District (Rezoning #Z22-034).

WHEREAS, application #Z22-034 is on file with the Department of Building and Zoning Services requesting rezoning of 2.51± acres from CPD, Commercial Planned Development District, to L-M, Limited Manufacturing District; and

This legislation authorizes the Director of Public Utilities to enter into a renewal of the contract with Roberts Service Group, Inc. for electric power system maintenance services for Department of Public Utilities, Division of Sewerage and Drainage facilities.

The Department of Public Utilities (DPU) has various electric power equipment at the Division of Sewerage and Drainage (DOSD), the Division of Power (DOP), and the Division of Water (DOW) that requires maintenance services. This equipment is located throughout the facilities associated with DPU's sewage and storm water collection systems and water distribution system, including at the two (2) Wastewater Treatment Plants, Compost Facility, Sewer Maintenance Operations Center, and three (3) Water Treatment Plants. The equipment is also located at various electric substations that service the City of Columbus and its satellite communities.

The work performed under the current contract is for electric power distribution systems and their components that require inspection, testing, maintenance, and repair or replacement, with the majority of the work for industrial equipment and systems ranging from 120V to 15.5 kV. The contract also covers inspection, testing, maintenance, and repair or replacement work on equipment and systems >15.5 kV to 138 kV that requires a contractor or subcontractor with highly specialized experience in high voltage equipment.

Two hundred and two (202) vendors were solicited (RFQ10714), and four (4) proposals were received and opened on November 7, 2018. Roberts Service Group, Inc. was determined to be the most qualified responder to provide the necessary electric power system maintenance services.

The original contract, PO153604, was established for a period of one (1) year with three (3) additional one (1) year renewal options contingent upon mutual agreement, availability of funding and approval by Columbus City Council. A recent modification was enacted to extend the contract to allow the Division of Power to repair a failed substation that supports the O'Shaughnessy Dam. That modification #2 extended the contract six (6) months to July 16, 2023. This renewal #4 adds funding to support DOSD's electric power system maintenance

service needs throughout the additional six months, including switching station inspections and repairs at the Southerly Wastewater Treatment Plant. All terms and conditions of the original agreement remain in full force and effect.

Background: The Gravity Project 2, LLC (together with its affiliates, collectively, the "Developer") will design and construct the Gravity Phase II urban redevelopment project ("Project") located between Broad Street, State Street, McDowell Street and the CSX railroad. The City, the Developer, and Columbus Housing Partnership (dba "Homeport") entered into an Economic Development Agreement dated September 27, 2019 (the "EDA") to further the Project and McDowell Place, the LIHTC project to be constructed by Homeport. Pursuant to that EDA, the Developer committed to dedicating at least two hundred (200) spaces for public use (the "Dedicated Public Spaces") of the approximate nine-hundred (900) parking spaces structured parking facility (the "Parking Facility Project"), and the City agreed to a contribution of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for each of the Dedicated Public Spaces in an amount not to exceed a total contribution of two-million dollars (the "Contribution"). City Council previously passed Ordinance 0911-2020 on May 18, 2020 to authorize the Director of the Department of Development to enter into a Neighborhood Structured Parking Incentive Contribution Agreement (the "Agreement") with the Developer and to authorize the transfer, appropriation, and expenditure of the first 25% of the Contribution (\$500,000) from the West Edge II TIF Fund and the East Franklinton TIF Fund. Following the passage of the 2020 Capital Improvement Budget impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, City Council passed Ordinance 1068-2021 on May 10, 2021 to authorize the expenditure

of the remaining 75% of the Contribution (\$1,500,000). In order to provide greater financial flexibility to the City's capital improvement budget, this legislation will authorize the transfer, appropriation, and expenditure of \$1,000,000 collectively in the West Edge I TIF Fund (7420), West Edge II TIF Fund (7422), and the East Franklinton TIF Fund (7463) as a substitution for the \$1,000,000 of the funds on the Auditor's Certificate associated with Ordinance 1068-2021. This ordinance authorizes the Director of the Recreation and Parks Department to submit a grant application to MORPC to build a significant section of the Big Walnut Greenway on the Far East side of the city, from Nafzger Park near Refugee Road to Big Walnut Park near East Main Street. This area of the City has very few bike and pedestrian facilities. It also rates on the High Injury Network as a dangerous area to bike or walk.

Five neighborhood connections would be added, providing connectivity for over 50,000 residents to the regional network. All of the alignment will be separated trail. This project is a collaborative effort with the Cities of Whitehall and Gahanna. When completed, over 12 miles of greenway corridor will be connected.

BACKGROUND: This ordinance authorizes the appropriation and expenditure of up to \$45,000.00 from two HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) grants and authorizes the Director of the Department of Development to enter into a HOME commitment letter, loan agreement, promissory note, mortgage, and restrictive covenant with individual homebuyers who access the American Dream Down payment Assistance (ADDI) program.

The City of Columbus provides down payment assistance with HOME funds to first time homebuyers whose household income is at or below 80% AMI for purchase of a home in the City of Columbus or Columbus City School District. BACKGROUND: The Council of the City of Columbus previously adopted an ordinance levying property assessed clean energy ("PACE") special assessments on certain property located at 114 E. Fifth Avenue and owned by Fifth Summit QOZB, LLC. The special assessments repay and secure financing for special energy improvement projects installed at the property. The financing was provided by PACE Equity LLC ("PACE Equity").

Under the authority granted by Ordinance No. 0311-2019, the City entered into a Standing Assignment Agreement dated as of July 24, 2019 (the "Standing Assignment Agreement") with the Columbus Regional Energy Special Improvement District, Inc. (the "District") and Addendum No. 2020-07 dated as of October 7, 2020 (the "Addendum") with the District. Under the Standing Assignment Agreement and the Addendum, the City agreed to cooperate with the other parties to reduce the amount of the special assessments levied if all or a portion of the financing was prepaid.

The Owner and PACE Equity have notified the City that the financing provided for the special energy improvement projects has been prepaid in full and have requested that the City reduce the special assessments previously levied down to \$0.00.

This legislation is to reduce the amount of the special assessments previously levied down to \$0.00 and to cause the County Auditor to remove the special assessments from the tax bills for the property.

Emergency action is requested on this legislation to allow the reduction of the special assessments to be certified to the County Auditor before real property tax bills for tax year 2022 are prepared.

FISCAL IMPACT: No funding is required for this legislation.

On October 3, 2012 the Columbus City Treasurer's Office issued a request for proposal, SA004617, for various banking services. The Columbus Depository Commission received and reviewed proposals from six (6) local banks and recommended, subject to the approval of City Council, the award of banking services to specific banks on April 18, 2013. All such banks are currently eligible depositories of the City of Columbus, pursuant to Chapter 321.04 of the Columbus City Code. 1. BACKGROUND

This legislation authorizes the Director of the Department of Development to enter into a Housing Development Agreement (HDA) and a funding agreement with Central Ohio Community Land Trust, an Ohio Non-profit Corporation (hereinafter the "COCLT"). The COCLT is a subsidiary of the Central Ohio Community Improvement Corporation, the Franklin County Land Reutilization Corporation.

COCLT is proposing to develop multiple houses in Columbus neighborhoods using land bank lots. The HDA will memorialize the City's desired commitment to the COCLT, pending City Council approval and current and future availability of funds. The Department of Development wishes to support COCLT projects by contributing a total of \$12,000,000 over three years. This legislation would authorize the Director of

Development to first execute the HDA and then a funding agreement in the amount of \$4,000,000.00. The projects will continue the successful development of Trust homes that started in 2019 when City Council authorized an initial \$4 million dollar investment (Council Ordinances 0227-2019 and 0872-2020) and an additional \$3.06 million dollars in 2021 (Council Ordinance 1059-2021). As of July, 2022, a total of 54 houses have been sold to income qualified buyers in Franklin County. This agreement will allow the continued expansion of the COCLT and continue ongoing projects.

Emergency action is requested in order to facilitate uninterrupted construction on another phase in the HNHF/Linden Healthy Homes project, which would be delayed by six months or more without emergency designation.

2. FISCAL IMPACTS

This ordinance authorizes an expenditure of \$4,000,000.00 in the Affordable Housing Bond Fund. It is necessary to certify the requisite funds in the amount of \$4,000,000.00 against the Special Income Tax Fund. Funds will be reimbursed with a future bond sale. An amendment to the 2022 Capital Improvement Budget is required to establish sufficient budget authority within the proper project.

BACKGROUND: Columbus Public Health has been awarded a grant from Franklin County Public Health to support the Franklin County Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Overdose Data to Action

(OD2A) Project. This ordinance is needed to accept and appropriate \$97,000.00 in grant monies to fund the Franklin County Overdose Data to Action Project grant program for the period of September 1, 2022 through August 31, 2023.

In August 2022, the Franklin County Coroner's Office (FCCO) released preliminary overdose death statistics that stated, "825 cases of overdose deaths were reported to the Franklin County Coroner's Office in 2021, a 4% decrease in the number of cases observed in 2020 (859) yet a 48% increase compared to 2019 (556). Franklin County observed an increase in overdose deaths from 2017 to 2020 which peaked in Q2 2020. Franklin County observed a decrease in overdose deaths from Q2 2020 to Q4 2020." It is suspected that illicit fentanyl is involved in nearly 90% of the drug overdose deaths in Franklin County. Additionally, the report states "Those who identified as non-Hispanic African American, increased from 21% to 29% from 2017 to 2021.

This ordinance is submitted as an emergency so a delay in services does not occur due to the start date September 1, 2022.

FISCAL IMPACT: The Franklin County CDC Overdose Data to Action Project Grant is fully funded (\$97,000.00) by Franklin County Public Health and does not require a City match.

To authorize and direct the Board of Health to accept a grant from Franklin County Public Health for the Franklin County CDC Overdose Data to Action Project Grant in the amount of \$97,000.00; to authorize the appropriation of \$97,000.00 to the Health Department in the Health Department's Grants Fund; and to declare an emergency. BACKGROUND: Columbus Public Health has been awarded a grant from the Ohio Department of Health. This ordinance is needed to accept and appropriate \$244,500.00 in grant money to fund the Cribs for Kids and Safe Sleep grant program, for the period October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023.

This project will work to reduce sleep-related infant deaths through the provision of safe sleep environments and safe sleep education. One thousand eligible families will be provided with cribs and safe sleep survival kits. This program will serve all of Franklin County but have a primary focus on the geographic areas with the highest rates of infant mortality and populations of the highest need of this program.

This ordinance is submitted as an emergency to continue the support of all activities for the Cribs for Kids and Safe Sleep grant program.

FISCAL IMPACT: The Cribs for Kids and Safe Sleep grant program is entirely funded by the Ohio Department of Health and does not generate revenue or require a City Match.

To authorize and direct the Board of Health to accept a grant from the Ohio Department of Health in the amount of \$244,500.00 for the Cribs for Kids and Safe Sleep grant program; to authorize the appropriation of \$244,500.00 from the unappropriated balance of the Health Department Grants Fund; and to declare an emergency. (\$244,500.00)

WHEREAS, \$244,500.00 in grant funds have been made available through the Ohio Department of Health for the Cribs for Kids and Safe Sleep grant program for the period of October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023; and,

This ordinance authorizes the City Auditor to create an ACDI in order to complete reimbursement requests for various property owners awarded a grant under the Sidewalk Repair Grant Program. The previous ACDI created to make reimbursement payments has been exhausted.

Ordinance 2584-2016 authorized the expenditure of up to \$550,000.00 to establish funding to issue grant payments. This legislation also authorized payment of grant money to various property owners awarded a grant under the Sidewalk Repair Grant Program that make their own repairs, or authorizes payment of grant funds direct to the various contractors that made the repairs if the awarded property owner chooses to hire a contractor to make the repairs. ACDI000201 was created through this ordinance in the amount of \$550,000.00

Ordinance 1510-2019 cancelled ACDI000201 and re-established two Auditor Certificates. Auditor Certificate ACDI000840 was established to allow reimbursement of property owners that make required sidewalk repairs on their own in the amount of \$50,000.00.

This ordinance is requesting a new ACDI be established in the amount of \$50,000.00 using funds remaining in the project to pay for reimbursement requests that have been submitted and approved and allow for the payment of future reimbursement requests to the property owners who have be awarded the grant.

2. FISCAL IMPACT

Funding in the amount of \$50,000.00 is available within Fund 7704, the Streets and Highways Bond Fund within the Department of Public Service. An amendment to the 2022 Capital Improvements Budget is required to establish sufficient budget authority for the project. Funds need to be appropriated.

3. EMERGENCY DESIGNATION

Emergency action is requested to avoid further delay in making reimbursement request payments to property owners awarded a grant under the Sidewalk Repair Grant Program.

To amend the 2022 Capital Improvement budget; to authorize the expenditure of up to \$50,000.00 within the Streets and Highways Improvement Bond Fund to make grant payments under the Sidewalk Repair Grant Program; and to declare an emergency. (\$50,000.00)



Sec. 42-16. Conferring special privilege by initiated ordinance or charter amendment.

A) Restraint of trade or commerce being injurious to this state and its citizens, including citizens of the City of Columbus, the power of the initiative shall not be used to pass an ordinance or an amendment to the city charter that would grant or create a monopoly, oligopoly, or cartel; specify

- or determine a tax rate; or confer a commercial interest, commercial right, or commercial license to any person, nonpublic entity, or group of persons or nonpublic entities, or any combination thereof, however organized, that is not then available to other similarly situated persons or nonpublic entities.
- B) The power of the initiative shall not be used to pass an ordinance authorizing the city to become a stockholder in any joint stock company, corporation, or association of any kind; or to raise money for, or to loan its credit to, or in aid of, any private company, corporation, or association of any kind in such manner as to violate Article VIII, Sec. 6 of the Ohio Constitution.
- C) If an ordinance or charter amendment proposed by initiative petition is certified to appear on the ballot, and in the opinion of the City Attorney, the ordinance or amendment would conflict with division (A) or (B) of this Section, the City Council shall prescribe two separate questions to appear on the ballot, as follows:
 - a. The first question shall be as follows:

2199-2022 Attachment - FINAL PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CHARTER Civil Service:

Sec. 60. - Mayor's power to appoint and remove officers.

The mayor shall appoint and shall have power to remove the following officers:

- 1. The director of public safety.
- 2. The director of public service.
- 3. Any other officers whose positions may be created by council and for whose appointment no provision is herein made.
- 4. Executive Staff of the office of the mayor.

Sec. 62-1. – Mayor's cabinet

The mayor shall establish a cabinet consisting of the directors of the departments created by this charter and by ordinance of council along with the Executive Staff appointed pursuant to Sec. 60.

Sec. 64. - Acting mayor.

If the mayor <u>is</u> be temporarily absent from the city, the mayor may <u>designate a member of the mayor's cabinet</u> the director of public service, the director of public safety, or the president of city council as acting mayor. During a period of temporary absence of the mayor, the acting mayor so designated shall exercise such powers and duties of the office of mayor as the mayor shall delegate. Nothing herein shall prevent the president of city council from exercising the president's powers and duties as member of council during the temporary absence or inability of the mayor.

Sec. 64-1. - Temporary inability.

If the mayor is unable to discharge the powers and duties of office, such inability being of temporary duration, the mayor, or the mayor's agent, shall transmit to the director of public service, the director of public safety, or the president of city council a designated member of the mayor's cabinet, a signed, written declaration setting forth the reasons for such inability and the city clerk shall be notified of the same; provided that failure to do so shall not prevent the proper officer from performing the powers and duties of the office. The recipient of such declaration shall be designated as acting mayor. During a period of temporary inability of the mayor, the powers and duties of the office of mayor shall devolve upon the acting mayor. Such declaration shall be in effect until such time as the declaration is rescinded in like manner, or six months have passed, or the office is vacated. For the purpose of this section, the mayor shall file with the city clerk a notarized statement, on a form prescribed by the city clerk, setting forth the name of one or more persons designated as the mayor's agent(s). The filing shall be made by the second meeting of council each January and may be amended at any time.

Sec. 148. Classification.

- 1) The Unclassified service shall include:
- (b) Executive <u>Staff assistants and administrative assistants to and all other staff of the office of</u> the mayor unless stated otherwise in this section.

Sec. 149. Rules.

The commission shall prescribe, amend and enforce rules for the classified service, shall keep minutes of its proceedings and records of its examinations and shall make investigations concerning the enforcement and effect of the civil service provisions and of the rules thereunder. It shall make an annual report to the Mayor. The rules shall provide:

(b) For open competitive examination in the competitive class, to test the relative fitness knowledge, skills, abilities and other characteristics of applicants for such positions. Employees of any public utility entity taken over by the city, who are in the service of said utility entity at the time of such acquisition, shall come under the provisions of the merit system without examination, but vacancies thereafter occurring in such service shall be filled from eligible lists in the manner herein provided.

- (c) For public notice in the City Bulletin or otherwise on the City website of the time and place of all competitive examinations.
- (e) For the rejection of candidates or eligibles who fail to eomply with reasonable requirements as to age, sex, physical conditions and moral character meet job related qualifications and standards, or who have attempted deception or fraud in connection with any examination.
- (f) For the use of no fewer more than three bands for each competitive eligible list, for the assignment of eligibles into bands based upon their test scores and for the certification to the appointing authority, from the appropriate eligible list to fill a vacancy in the competitive class. , of persons standing in the highest band on such list. When the highest band contains fewer than five names the names of persons standing in the next highest band may also be certified.
- (g) For temporary provisional employment without examination, in the absence of an eligible list. But no such temporary employment shall continue after the establishment of a suitable eligible list.
- (i) For noncompetitive examinations for appointments to positions requiring peculiar and exceptional qualifications of a scientific, managerial, professional or educational character. Also for noncompetitive testing appointments for certain unskilled job categories where it is impracticable to determine the merit and fitness of applicants by competitive examinations.
- (j) For promotion based on competitive examinations and records of efficiency, character, conduct fitness demonstrated knowledge, skills, abilities, and seniority, and other characteristics associated with such positions. Lists shall be created and promotions made therefrom of candidates in the same manner as in original appointments; provided that for promotional vacancies in the uniformed ranks of the Police and Fire Divisions, including any competitive vacancy for which the entry level position was firefighter or police officer, the names of eligibles shall not be assigned into bands as provided in subsection (f) and each promotional vacancy shall be filled from one of the three persons standing highest on the appropriate eligible list; and further provided, that any advancement in the uniformed ranks shall constitute promotion and, whenever practicable, vacancies in the uniformed ranks shall be filled by promotion.
- (n) For investigating and keeping a record of the efficiency of officers and employees in the classified service, and for requiring markings and reports relative thereto from appointing officers.
- (o) For a probationary period of not less than one month-90 days nor more than one year following appointment, unless associated with a formal training program. Service as a Time served as a provisional employee in the same position to be shall be included in such the designated probationary period, and with the probationary period to shall be uniform within the same class, provided, however, that t There shall be no probationary period for an appointment resulting from a competitive, promotional examination for the uniformed ranks of the Police and Fire Divisions. The probationary period shall be considered a part of the selection process as a work test period. Unless resulting from a competitive, promotional examination, n No appointment shall be permanent until after appointment from a certification list and expiration of the probationary period. The service of any probationary employee may be terminated by the appointing authority at any time during the probationary period or at the end of the probationary period by submitting a written report to the commission and the employee specifying the reason the employee is found to be unsatisfactory and such removal shall be final. Unless the employee has been removed earlier, the appointing authority shall, not less than ten calendar days prior to the end of the probationary period, submit a report to the commission of the decision to make the appointment permanent or remove such employee together with the reason therefor. Failure to make such report to the commission at least ten days-prior to the expiration of the probationary period shall automatically make the appointment permanent. An employee removed by the appointing authority during or at the end of the

probationary period may be restored to the eligible list if the commission determines the employee would be suitable for appointment to another position. There shall be no appeal of any kind from the action of the appointing authority removing an employee during or at the end of the probationary period.

Sec. 149-1. Appeals.

Except as otherwise provided in this charter any employee of the City of Columbus in the classified service, who is suspended, reduced in rank or compensation or discharged except building and housing regulations superintendent, recreation superintendent, sealer of weights and measures, workhouse superintendent, automotive shop superintendent of the division of municipal garage, sanitation superintendent, and parks superintendent may appeal from such decision or order therefor, to the civil service commission within ten days from and after the date of such decision or order. In such event, the commission shall forthwith notify the official issuing the order of suspension, reduction or discharge, who shall forthwith transmit to the commission a copy of the charges and proceedings thereunder. The commission shall hear such appeal in accordance with the established commission rules, ten days from after the filing of the same with the commission and may affirm, disaffirm or modify the action of such officer and the commission's judgment in the matter shall be final. In the event that the name of any of the positions enumerated above is hereafter changed, the exception expressed above shall apply to the successor position whatever name it may be called.

Sec. 151. Appointments.

When a position in the competitive classified service is to be filled, the appointing authority shall notify the commission of that fact and the commission shall certify, to such authority names and addresses of candidates standing in the highest band on the eligible list for the class to which such position belongs; provided that for promotions in the uniformed ranks of the Police and Fire Divisions only three names shall be certified. The appointing authority shall appoint one of the persons certified to such position in accordance with established Commission rules. When the eligible list contains less than five names, or less than three names in the case of promotions in the uniformed ranks of the Police and Fire Divisions, then such names shall be certified, from which number the appointing authority may appoint one for such position.

When no eligible list for such position exists, or when the eligible list has become exhausted and until a new list can be created, the appointing authority may make a temporary provisional appointment. A person certified from an eligible list more than three times to the same or similar position may be omitted from future certifications to such appointing authority.

Sec. 152. Present Civil Service Employees.

All persons holding positions in the service of the city pursuant to appointment from eligible lists at the time this charter takes effect, or who have been continuously in the service of the city in the same position for the five years next preceding, and all persons holding positions in the unskilled labor classification at the time that the amendment of section 148 of the charter of the City of Columbus, Ohio, takes effect and who have held such positions continuously for at least ninety days next preceding, shall retain their positions until discharged, reduced, promoted, or transferred in accordance with the provisions of this charter. The commission shall maintain a list of all persons in the service, showing in connection with each name, the position held, the date and character of each appointment and of every subsequent change in status. Each appointing officer shall promptly transmit to the commission all information required for the establishment and maintenance of the list.

Sec. 158-1. Resident requirements for certain employees.

Unless otherwise specifically provided by this Charter, all employees in the unclassified service and in the competitive class of classified service of the City shall at all times, during their employment, maintain their residence within the boundary lines of the County of Franklin or within the boundary lines of the counties that border on the County of Franklin, except when assigned to City work outside said counties in which case residency within the counties wherein they work shall be required.

Residency shall be in accordance with general laws of the state of Ohio.

Amendment No. 3, City Modernization

The proposed amendment to the city charter seeks to allow for modernization of certain city operations and provide flexibility in the use of technology, while bringing outdated sections in line with current state law. The first area is in open meetings: the amendment will maintain the requirement that meetings of public bodies of the city be held in accordance with the general laws of the state, while allowing those bodies to conduct their meetings by virtual means (teleconference, video conference, or other similar technology), if allowed by ordinance of council. The ordinance of council would provide for the circumstances by which this would occur, as well as set rules for same. The amendment would also allow a special or emergency meeting of council to be called as provided for by the charter and ordinance of council, rather than the general laws of the state, thereby also affording council the ability to conduct such meetings by virtual means.

The amendment would also allow for modernization in the area of auditing and city finances. The changes update language reflecting how financial transactions of the city operate, as well as align a function of the city auditor with the Ohio Revised Code. The amendment includes the following: changes the statement from the city auditor for the mayor's estimate to contain revenues of the general fund, rather than just income from taxes; removes the requirement to specify upon the warrant the funds upon which a warrant is drawn; gives the Auditor the ability to determine the form of a warrant as provided by state law or council ordinance; simplifies the section allowing for Council to determine by ordinance how and where city investment monies are deposited and sold; updates language referring to how outstanding utility debt is paid or transferred to a fund in order to pay interest on said debt; and changes the keeper of records relating to oaths of office of elected officials from the Auditor to the City Clerk.

Shall the proposed Amendment to the Columbus City Charter be adopted?

Full text: Ordinance 2200-2022

..Explanation

This ordinance provides for the submission to the electors of the city of Columbus the question of amending the Charter of the City of Columbus, as relates to the modernization of certain city functions. These amendments are based on the recommendations of the 2022 Columbus Charter Review Commission.

On July 6, 2022, the Charter Review Commission, appointed by Mayor Andrew J. Ginther and Council President Shannon Hardin, adopted five (5) comprehensive recommendations. A report summarizing those recommendations was submitted to Council on July 9, 2022 and is attached to this ordinance.

Based on council's consideration of the commission's recommendations, council proposes a ballot question regarding the modernization of certain city operations. Proposed Charter Amendment No. 3, City Modernization, addresses the following:

- · Allowing for a special or emergency meeting of council to be called as provided for by the charter and ordinance of council, rather than by the general laws of the state
- Maintaining that public bodies of the city hold all meetings in accordance with general laws of the state, with the exception that council, by ordinance, may allow for conducting business by virtual means (teleconference, video conference, or other similar technology), and provide for the circumstances by which this occurs
- · Changing the statement from the city auditor for the mayor's estimate to include revenues of the general fund, rather than just income from taxes
- Removing the requirement to specify upon the warrant the funds upon which the warrant is drawn
- Giving the city auditor the ability to determine the form of a warrant as provided by state law or council ordinance
- · Simplifying the section allowing council to determine by ordinance how and where city investment monies are deposited and sold.
- · Updating language referring to how outstanding utility debt is paid or transferred to a fund in order to pay interest on said debt
- · Changing the keeper of records relating to oaths of office of elected officials from the city auditor to the city clerk

..Title

To submit to the electors of the city of Columbus at a special election to be held concurrently with the regular general election on November 8, 2022, the question of amending the Charter of the City of Columbus, such question to be known as "Proposed Charter Amendment No. 3, City Modernization"; and to declare an emergency.

..Body

WHEREAS, on January 10, 2022, Council President Shannon Hardin and Mayor Andrew J. Ginther appointed a five-member Charter Review Commission to conduct a review of the city's charter; and

WHEREAS, the highly regarded community leaders who served on the commission held eleven public working meetings, solicited public comment via two public hearings, an online portal, and a dedicated email address, and, based on such deliberations, submitted recommendations to the mayor and council president on July 9, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the Charter Review Commission made five comprehensive recommendations, all of which necessitate changes to the charter; and

WHEREAS, this council finds that the residents of Columbus will be well-served by proposed charter amendments detailing the city's modernization efforts; and

WHEREAS, an emergency exists in the usual daily operation of the various departments of the city, in that it is immediately necessary to authorize submission of Proposed Charter Amendment No. 3, City Modernization to the electors to assure timely filing with the boards of elections for placement on the November 8, 2022 ballot, thereby preserving the public health, peace, property, safety and welfare; NOW, THEREFORE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUMBUS:

SECTION 1. The city council hereby finds that a regular municipal election will not be held in 2022. Therefore, pursuant to City Charter Section 45-2, a special election is hereby called to place the question hereinafter set forth on the November 8, 2022 ballot at a special election to be held concurrently with the general election, a date not less than 60 nor more than 120 days from passage of this ordinance.

SECTION 2. That there be submitted to the electors of the city of Columbus the question of amending the Charter of the City of Columbus, such question and proposed amendments being set forth as an attachment (FINAL PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CHARTER City Modernization) hereto and hereby made a part hereof.

SECTION 3. That the question submitted in Section 2 be and hereby is known as "Proposed Charter Amendment No. 3, City Modernization."

SECTION 4. That the city clerk is directed to forthwith serve a certified copy of this ordinance upon the boards of elections of Franklin County, Delaware County, and Fairfield County, Ohio.

SECTION 5. That the boards of elections of Franklin County, Delaware County, and Fairfield County, Ohio be and hereby are requested to place the question, "Proposed Charter Amendment No. 3, City Modernization" upon the ballot to be submitted to the electors as provided for and upon the date set forth herein.

SECTION 6. That for the reasons stated in the preamble hereto, which is hereby made a part hereof, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after passage and approval by the Mayor, or ten days after passage if the Mayor does not approve the same.

2200-2022 Attachment - FINAL PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CHARTER City Modernization

Sec. 8. - Meetings of council.

At 5 o'clock p.m., on the first Monday in January, following a regular municipal election, the council shall meet at the usual place for holding meetings. If the first Monday in January is a legal holiday, then the meeting shall be held on the following day. Thereafter the council shall meet at such times as may be prescribed by ordinance or resolution; provided that at least fifty regular meetings shall be held in each year. The mayor, the president of the council, or any three members thereof may call special or emergency meetings of the council as provided for by general laws of the state this charter and ordinance of council. All meetings of the council or committees thereof shall be held in public in accordance with the general laws of Ohio pertaining to the requirements for open meetings of public meetings as provided for by this charter and ordinance of council bodies and the minutes and records thereof shall be maintained as an electronic record that is made available to the public pursuant to the general laws of the state governing public records.

Sec. 26. Mayor's estimate.

(f) A statement from the city auditor of the total probable income revenues of the city's General Fund from taxes for the period covered by the mayor's estimate.

Sec. 84. [Payment of claims.]

The auditor shall draw the warrant on the treasury to the order of the person or persons to whom payment is lawfully due, which warrant shall specify the fund upon which it is drawn. No payment, however, of any claim shall be deemed as lawful and subject to payment by the auditor unless it be pursuant to and in strict compliance with an appropriation by council and written approval by the head of the department in which the obligation was incurred.

Sec. 91. [Disbursement of funds.]

The treasurer shall disburse funds in custody only on warrant of the auditor, unless otherwise directed by the general laws of the state or this charter. The auditor shall prescribe the form of warrant to be issued as provided for under the general laws of the state or by ordinance of Council.

Sec. 93. [Depositories and investments.]

Council shall provide by ordinance for the deposit of all public moneys coming into the hands of the treasurer, in such bank or banks, or building and loan or savings association or companies, situated within the county, as offer, at competitive bidding, the highest rate of interest and give good and sufficient security. Council shall further provide by ordinance for regulations governing the investment of moneys of the municipal corporation and the sale of such investments.

Sec. 120. Outstanding utility debt obligations.

The city shall, out of the revenues of the city utilities, unless another funding source is determined by the mayor and the city auditor, with approval of council, cause to be paid and or transferred to a utility debt obligation bond retirement fund of the city a sufficient amount of money to pay the interest and principal on outstanding utility debt obligations as they mature.

Sec. 226. Oath of office.

Every officer of the city shall, before entering upon the duties of office, take and subscribe to an oath or affirmation as required by general law, which oath or affirmation shall be filed and kept in the office of the auditor city clerk.

Sec. 240. - Open meetings.

The public bodies of the city shall hold all meetings in accordance with the general laws of the state pertaining to open meetings except that council may, by ordinance, provide for the ability of public bodies to hold, attend, conduct, and keep minutes for virtual meetings and hearings by means of teleconference, video conference, or any other similar technology and council may provide for the circumstances under which such virtual meetings or hearings may be held. In addition to those entities defined as public bodies in the general laws of the state, an entity of the city shall be considered a public body for purposes of this section if its members are appointed to serve as a member of the public body by an officer of the city, and the entity has been established and its members appointed for the sole purpose of advising any officer or decision-making body of the city.
