Healthy Places Walkability Study Walnut Heights Neighborhood Pride

Columbus Public Health Healthy Places program is conducting walkability studies in the 2007 Neighborhood Pride areas. The goals of the walkability study are to increase neighborhood residents walking in their neighborhood and to identify destination places that are within walking distance. This will be done by walking with neighborhood residents to 1) identify positive places to walk in their neighborhood; 2) inventory barriers to pedestrians and bikers; and 3) identify neighborhood destinations.

Of the five Walnut Heights residents that walked, the newest person in the neighborhood had lived there for 20 years. These residents are vested in their neighborhood and want to see it continue to be a nice place to raise a family and live. There are some concerns that people do not take care of their homes; that renters do not care about the community; and that their infrastructure will need work soon. However, they are close knit and welcome new families to their neighborhood. The Community of Faith Church is in the center of the neighborhood and does significant outreach to the community. They have recently begun youth sports leagues on fields which have been vacant for years.

Overall Comments

- Carbondale and Denmark are the main arteries.
- Kids hang out in the park at night. (beer bottles were found in the park)
- On Lindora the sidewalk stops near the convenience store and day care.
- The ADA ramps are not at all corners.
- There are paths to the school through the houses so the children can walk to school. They need repayed and the fences are rusty now.
- Trees are mature and provide good shade for walking.
- Cars will yield for walkers.
- Crosswalks near school need repainted but the City will only do them if the school provides crossing guards. But the crosswalks would benefit the whole neighborhood.
- I don't feel safe at night, kids are out roaming.
- Kids out roaming is nothing new, that happened when my kids were young.
- Neighbors wave to each other.
- Some people don't take care of the neighborhood.
- I don't walk in the neighborhood because there is no one to walk with.
- Renters don't mow their lawns and they play loud music.
- People speed down Carbondale Drive.
- I have to pick trash up out of my yard everyday.
- Our sidewalks are pushed up from the city trees' roots
- I see early evening walkers but not many night time walkers.




