If you are not a U.S. citizen or national, you will need your alien registration number and expiration date.

Dress for Success Columbus

Description: Dress for Success Columbus assists disadvantaged women with workplace-appropriate clothing and

career building tools as they prepare to return to the workforce. A referral from a partner agency is

required. The "Interview Suiting" includes a skirt or pant suit, shirt/blouse, footwear, nylons,

handbag/briefcase, accessories and personal care products. The service is for women who are job-ready and may have an interview or job/career fair appointment. While women seek employment, they are welcome to use the Career Center in the Dress for Success Columbus facility. It provides computers, a printer, fax machine and written reference materials for professional development. Appointments with HR professionals to meet one-on-one for resume review and soft-skills training are scheduled twice a month. Once a woman secures a job, "Employment Suiting" offers a week's worth of workplace-appropriate clothing, footwear, accessories and personal care products. Membership in Professional

Women's Group, our employment retention program, is available for women who are employed and received services through our interview and employment dressing program. **All Services are free of**

charge and by appointment only for every woman we serve.

agencies Apprisen, the Godman Guild Association, and New Directions Career Center work together

with the Women's Leadership Council (WLC) of the United Way of Central Ohio to present a

comprehensive curriculum of educational readiness, career development, financial literacy and personal enrichment topics that will address matters of school application and enrollment, financial aid, work-life balance, career advancement and more! Following the Preparation Program, E3 provides Support Services for up to 48 months, while you're in school. Benefits include Employment Services, Case Management, Support Groups, Resource Assistance and Mentorship from the WLC. Requires high

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IMPACT Community Action- Empowerment Services

Description: IMPACT has a variety of workforce development courses and programs through their Empowerment

Services Division including Connections, a two-week job readiness program, an entrepreneurship course, vocational training and certificate courses, a re-entry work readiness program, and the AMP program from in-school youth ages 16-18 offering four career track paid training programs. Workforce development training requires income eligibility. General services include individual employment plans, paid job training, job coaching, National Work Readiness certification, computer training, referrals and additional support to address other barriers to employment and self-sufficiency. Individuals must have photo identification for household members ages 18 and over, Social Security cards for all household members and 90-days' proof of income. IMPACT also offers computer and financial services to eligible community

members.

Description: A Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) offering a work training program to low-

income, unemployed jobseekers who are 55 and older living in Franklin, Delaware, Licking and Madison Counties. PROGRAMS FOR IMMIGRANTS/REFUGEES

Community Refugee and Immigration Services

Description: Employment counseling, individualized soft-skills training, job development and placement assistance,

resume preparation, and help with job-related translation and interpretation. English as a Second language (ESL) classroom instruction is offered and focuses primarily on American culture and the workplace, though is currently only available via referral from Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services. Services are free and offered for refugees, asylees and immigrants who are work-

authorized in the United States.

Once students have completed training, our job developers link individuals to employment opportunities. Our job developers work with both basic skills opportunities,

as well as helping those with advanced education link to employment options. Refugee, immigrant or

Veterans Administration – General Resources

Description: The Veterans Administration offers a variety of resources to assist veterans in this transition to the civilian

workforce. Offerings include attending a Transition Assistance Program (TAP Briefing), use of the Career Scope assessment to determine relevant careers, access to a free year of LinkedIn Learning, assistance translating military skills and experience to the civilian job search, and use of Department of Labor job search function to find preferential employers. Those that experienced injury or disability in the line of duty may also be eligible for Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) (formerly known as Vocational



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Rehabilitation and Employment) services to help with job training, employment accommodations, resume development, and job seeking skills coaching. Other services may be provided to assist veterans and service members in starting their own businesses or independent living services for those who are

severely disabled and unable to work in traditional employment.
